

# Negro Fair To Use Legion Fair Grounds

T. A. Hamme, Durham County Negro fair patron and secretary and general manager of the Durham County Negro Fair announced last night that he had completed a contract whereby the Durham County Negro Fair will be held this year on the American Legion Fair ground, just off the Oxford Highway.

Mr. Hamme expressed himself as being highly elated over securing the Legion Fair ground for the Negro fair this year.

The Negro fair opens Monday night October 7. The doors open at 6:30 P. M. Immediately after the week of the American Legion County a large herd of pure-bred cattle and several pens of Durham County's registered, pure-bred swine. Also a display for the Durham County Home in the main exhibit hall. This display will consist mainly of a large selection of various dried vegetables, fruits and etc. put up at the County Home, for the use of the inmates along with other phases of food and feed production at the County Home.

Mr. Hamme also stated that he had been very fortunate in being able to book for the Negro Fair one of the outstanding carnivals of the nation—Barney T. Bell Unit Shows. This show carries 10 shows; 8 riding devices and the usual number of concessions.

One of the most outstanding features of the show being John Eck, known as the miracle man and on whom Bob Ripley has pinned the title "The most remarkable man in the world."

respecting labor and insisted that every effort will be made to insure the Negro an equitable and proportionate share in training and placement in the defense industries.

Lieut. Oxley asserted that national defense can become effective only if behind it "there stands a truly united nation determined to use every ounce of its strength in support of democracy," and that there must be an equal participation in the affairs of our Government by all persons, regardless of race, creed or color. Above all, he added, every individual and each local community must be mindful of a responsibility in the activities of the Defense Program.

"There must be a spirit of active cooperation and helpfulness between Negro organizations, administrative agencies and local authorities," Lieut. Oxley said. He pointed out that much can be and should be accomplished in educating employers to the employment needs of the Negro if there is a closer relationship between Negro organizations and policy forming groups.

Lieut. Oxley discussed the program and objectives of the Negro Placement Service and told his listeners that this special unit was primarily concerned with stimulating an awareness among United States Employment Service personnel that all available Negro skills are needed for utilization in defense industries.

After stating the pressing necessity of training persons in the various trades and skills required for and essential in defense industries, the speaker encouraged his audience to lend every effort possible in developing an interest among Negroes to register in the training program so vital to our national defense.

**Oxley Urges Employment of Race in Defense Industries**

PITTSBURGH — A complete utilization of all available Negro skills needed in defense industries was urged by Lieut. Lawrence A. Oxley, Supervisor of the Negro Placement Service, Bureau of Employment Security in an address at the Warren Church before the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. He stressed particularly the thought that all available skills needed in defense industries must be utilized, but the speaker emphasized that all available Negro skills must be encouraged in the prosecution of the National Defense Program.

# LUNDEEN TO APPROVE PROPOSED YOUTH TRAINING PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2. (ANP)—Last week in the house of representatives, Louis Lundeen of Indiana took the floor to offer an amendment and initiated by the Federal Security agency, with the approval of the Council of National Defense and the Budget bureau, particularly interesting to Negro youths with regard to the proposed training program.

"No trainee under the foregoing appropriations shall be discriminated against because of sex, race or color and where separate schools are required by law for separate population groups, to the extent needed for trainees of each such group, equitable provision shall be made for facilities and training of like quality," his amendment reads.

In defending his amendment, Mr. Ludlow said: "If this provision is not inserted in the present law you will have one provision with reference to the draftees under the conscription law and a lack of the same provision under this act."

"I think the proposed amendment speaks for itself. As I say, it is the backing of the Federal Security administration, and it also has the support and approval of the advisory commission of the Council of National Defense, which finds it to be in harmony with its labor policy; and of the Budget bureau, which finds it to be in harmony with the program of the President. It injects no new policies into the administration of our laws but merely makes us act in respect of training conform to the policy already determined upon by Congress in respect to conscription under the new Conscription act. I respectfully ask the committee to adopt the amendment."

"I am happy to offer this amendment because it offers to the colored people of our country an assurance that there will be no discrimination against them in training for national defense. In every way, in which our country has engaged, Negroes have responded to the call of our country and have demonstrated their loyalty and devotion in

every way. Now that our beloved country is face to face with another emergency, they are manifesting the same spirit of patriotism that has guided them in former crisis of our national history and the amendment I have offered would remove racial barriers and guarantee their right to serve."

The amendment was agreed to.
