## Smith Takes Saints 18-6

FOR THE first time in North Carolina College history, the coach was able to wilfully keep most of his first string men idle throughout a game against the Shaw University Bears. Dick Mack, McPharland, and Johnson, backfield ace, were being 'saved' Peerman, Alton and Fines, ends were also idle. "Fuzzy" Williams, Raleigh backfield man who was being counted on for this game, was suspended from the squad during the preceding week because of being seen smoking, and was also among those absent from the gridiron. But the interesting part about this was that these fellows were never missed, from the time of kickoff until that 19-0 became the final score. In this game, which left the Eagles still unscathed on a 6-0 lead, NCC registered 6 first downs in comparison to 2 for Shaw. Both teams lost 50 yards each on 4 penalties; Shaw attempted 12 passes, completing 7, while the Eagles completed only 2 out of the 10 attempted. One Shaw pass was intercepted by the locals.

Hull, NCC blocking back, carried the ball sixth time for the season Saturday and paved the way for one of the touchdowns. He has with the ball exactly 6 times this season and has scored 4 touchdowns. NOT BAD FOR A GUY HIS SIZE. Those HILLSIDE HORNETS have really been giving Durham fans their heads. ### Eagle Reserves Claw Shaw

Durham — Coach W. F. Burghardt of North Carolina College kept most of his first string material right beside him on the bench last Saturday afternoon to match the reserves give the Shaw University Bears a 29-0 clawing before nearly 4,000 homecoming fans at O'Kelly field. Hardy, Moore and Lightner were plainly the stars of the Eagles brilliant offensive attack as they passed and ran for touchdowns after touchdowns and to roll up 7 first downs in comparison to 2 for Shaw.

Shaw received the opening kickoff and for a few seconds worthy and Haynes gained yardage at will through the Eagles line to get an early first down. However, it was not long before Kirksey, N. C. State end, intercepted Davis pass to get possession of the ball on the fifty yard line.

The action of this first quarter was mainly in the center of the field until a Shaw kick was blocked on their own 15 yard stripe. From this point, the Eagles used only 3 plays to score. After Lightner and Hall, Raleigh stars for NCC, had brought the ball to the 10, Lightner let go a well placed pass to Duckwilder in the end zone for the initial 6 points.

The Eagles seemed set upon scoring in every quarter of the game (as they did) but in the second quarter they had to content themselves with just two points. It was after a Shaw University fumble had placed the ball on their own 2 yard line that Lightner recovered a blocked kick behind the goal line for these two points. Toward the end of the quarter Duckwilder of the Eagles began a passing attack in the desperate attempt to

### Raleigh No Match For Hillside

Durham Smart offensive and defensive playing combined with powerful reserve strength featured in the 20-0 victory which the Hornets of Hillside Park School registered over the "Little Blues" of Raleigh's Washington High School at Durham Athletic Park yesterday afternoon. The passing of Page and Faulk of Raleigh was the only offensive threat of the visitors and it was a pass from Faulk to Hall that accounted for a 70 yard run to Hillside's 19 yard line in the fourth quarter. Hillside scored 13 points in the second quarter and seven more in the third.

This game started out to be a close affair with both sides tackling so hard that there were several fumbles. Lee of Hillside intercepted one of the many passes which the visitors attempted in this opening quarter and accounted for 12 first downs. Toward the end of the quarter Crump recovered a Hillside fumble on the 50 yard line and Raleigh staged a drive down to the 29 yard line where the ball went over on downs as the period ended.

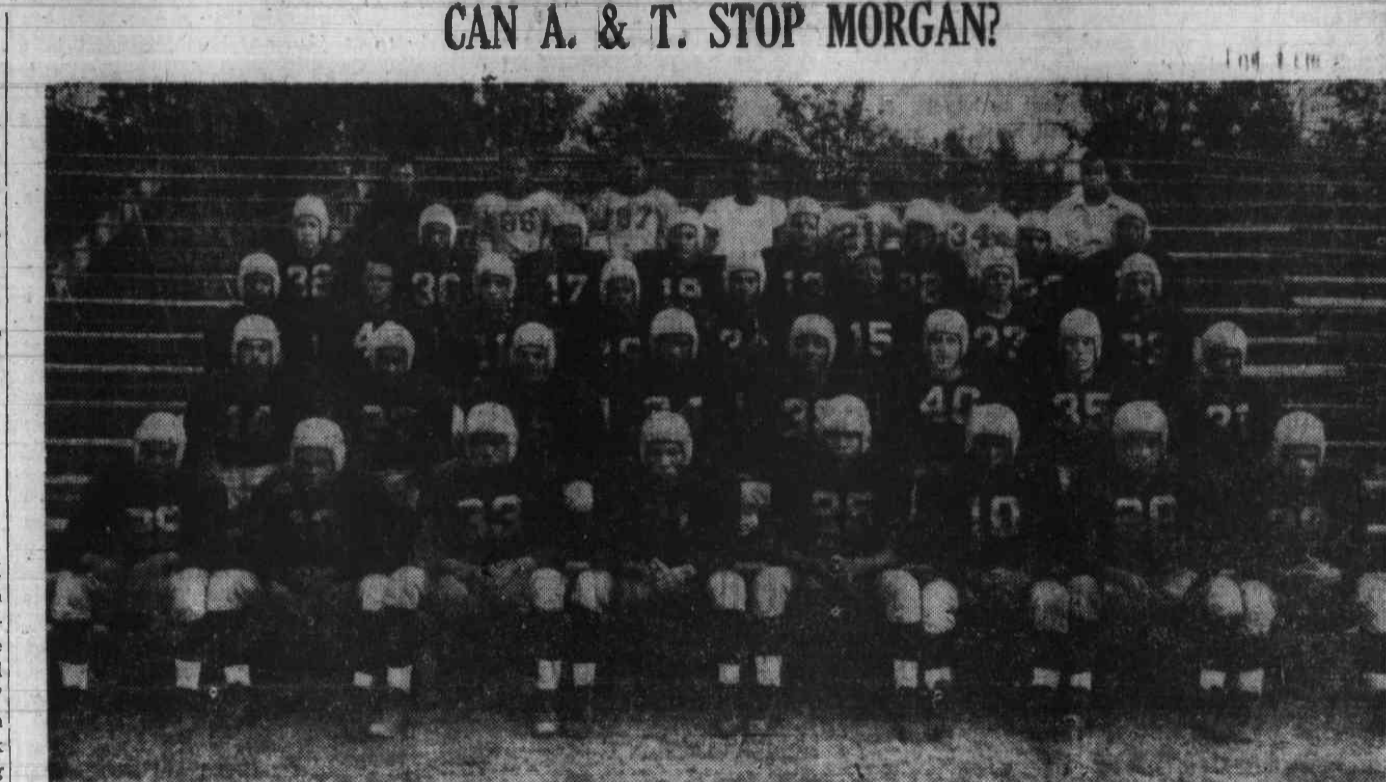
The first play of the second frame was a kick by Blount from his own 29 to the Raleigh 36. After a pass and two reverse plays by Washington High, Hillside's Lunsford recovered a fumble on the 38 and a touchdown drive was immediately staged. Lee led the drive with a four yard trot; Lunsford registered a first down when he caught a pass on the 10 yard strip after Blount had hurled it from kick formation. The Hornets ran three more plays before Blount finally crossed the goal line through tackle. Within a few minutes, Graves blocked a Raleigh kick and Lawrence, end, recovered on the 14 yard line. Plummer and Lee made short runs from here and Lee stepped across after a well placed pass by Co-captain Blount. Blount passed to Lunsford for the extra point.

Lee had just completed a 50 yard run after a pass from Blount as the half ended 13-0. In the third quarter the lone touchdown was made as the result of more heads up playing. Thompson intercepted a pass on the Raleigh 34 and later crossed the goal line untouched. Blount passed to Lawrence to make the count (and final score) 20-0.

In last minute desperation the visitors began flinging passes right and left. Most of them either batted down or intercepted but one of them made possible a 70 yard run by Hall.

Howard's score came in the last period when Mitchell received the ball on Morgan's five and ran off tackle to the goal.

### Hampton To Meet Howard At Armstrong Field

Hampton Va. — A Hampton eleven, badly battered with injuries, will be host to its old rival, Howard University, Saturday afternoon, November 9, at Armstrong Field. A bitter athletic rivalry between the two schools gives promise of a sensational, hard fought gridiron battle. The Seekiders are recognized as a stronger football aggregation, but their quota of bad breaks brings the odds down to practically even. There was other All-CIAA material unearthed on that rain soaked field. There was Hank Murphy, sophomore Bull back from Dohora, Pa. who kept a rabid crowd in the throes of frenzy with sensational running and passing. There was also Joe Tull, one of the Bulls' famed TNT twin guard combination, and Chet Guder, a newcomer from Mampson, N. Y., attaining brotherhood in the absence of the other twin, "Mouse" Toliver. But in the end, ability overcame inspiration. The Bulls opened up hostilities after Webb had earned an attempted Saint pass on his own 40 yard line. With Powell passing to Webb and McGirt storming through the line, the Gold and Blue made a sustained 60 yard to score on a 10 yard off tackle smash by McGirt. A few minutes later, when Webb's punting had driven the Saints deep into their own territory, Tull recovered a fumble on the 1 yard stripe and one play later McGirt rung up another 6 on the score register. Webb missed both conversions. Then Fate took a turn midway the third quarter. A pass from Johnson to Pullen from the St. Augustine 45 was ruled completed on the Bull 35 after Smith's interference with the pass receiver, Smith straightway drew a 16 yard penalty and again Johnson wound up, this time to Foxhall on the Bull 10. An off-side penalty on Smith advanced the Saints to the 5 and from there it was Johnson to Pullen for the score. Bembry made an unsuccessful attempt of the conversion.

Although they have lost for the season G-dfrey Dunmore, first string center, the Bears feel that with the return of fullback 'Joe' Spriggs injured in an early season game, "Jackie" Robinson, halfback also out the last three games because of injuries, and the return to form of "Brute" Owens, Shaw's cruel tackle, they will be in good shape to welcome the scrappy South Carolina Outfit.

And the 18-6 score gives a little indication of the terrific battle that Saints waged to keep in check the might and power of Coach Jackson's great machine. Aided by a muddy field that greatly hampered the Bull's great ground attack and put a decided crimp in its famed aerial circus, the Saints played not only inspired ball but gave one of their greatest gridiron performances.

On St. Augustine's campus this week such names as LeCompte, Johnson, Pullen, and Foxhall are being sung loud and long.
