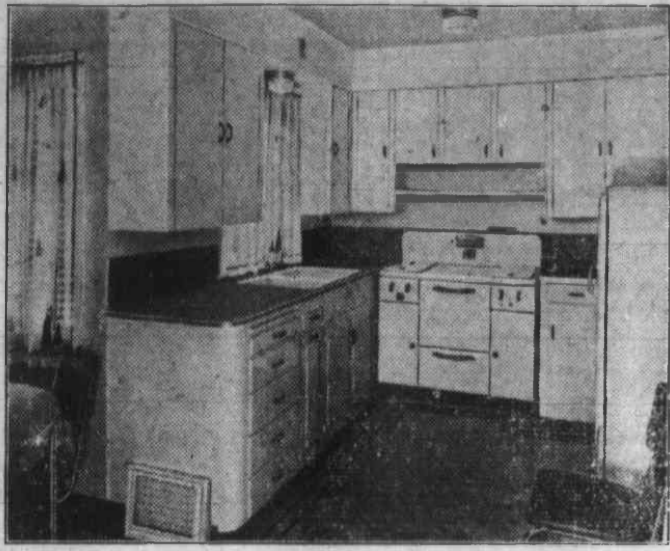


THE WOMAN'S PAGE
