

Luther Morrow Is Gassed For Shooting Wife, In The Back

Raleigh. —(CP)— Luther Morrow, 26-year-old Union county man, was executed in the death chamber Friday for the slaying of his wife, Mrs. Lottie Bell Morrow, after he had chased her into the field.

He had given notice of appeal in the fall term of the State Supreme Court, but his lawyer failed to file a brief and told the court he had initiated high court proceedings to have the Supreme court review the case and that he did not intend to appeal.

The court examined the case and, finding no error in the lower court decision, dismissed the case.

Governor J. M. Broughton and Paroles Commission Edwin Gill decided Thursday that no parole would be granted.

Morrow chased his wife into the field last August and when she fell and while she was lying face down, shot her in the back.

Judge Criticizes Jury's Verdict

Kinston. —(CP)— The jury erred when it returned a verdict of "not guilty" against Coy Tyndall, white, charged with violation of the state liquor laws, Judge W. H. B. Burgwyn said Tuesday morning.

He expressed belief that the jury erred in the verdict because two officers who testified against Tyndall did not take the stand.

"I don't see how the courts can enforce the law," he said, "as long as we have juries like this."

Negro Families Most Numerous in Skums

Greensboro. —(CP)— There at least three Negro families residing in local slum areas to each white family found in similar environments, the Greensboro Housing Authority said Friday.

The opinion was voiced upon the report of Dr. Henry Louis Smith of the local housing authority who explained that he believes a greater proportion of living units in the proposed housing project should be provided for Negroes than whites because poverty stricken Negro families are potentially more dangerous than whites.

Hampton Net Squad Includes Several Letter, Numeral Men

Hampton Institute, Va. — Basing judgment on present indication brought out thus far at practices, a strong cage team was predicted today by Coach James M. Griffin, for the current season at Hampton Institute.

Leon Kerry, who played on Hampton's last championship team four years ago, has returned to the institute and is expected to play a stellar role in the 1942 season.

According to Griffin, the squad has seven lettermen: Captain George Thompson, Middletown, Ohio; Jules Jackson, Montgomery, West Virginia; Robert Watts, St. Louis, Missouri; Robert Penn, Danville, Virginia; Lloyd Saunders, Montgomery, West Virginia; George Chamberlain, Charleston, West Virginia; John Phillips, Hampton.

In addition, the 1942 squad lists

eight numeral men: Coston Smith, Springfield, Massachusetts; Wilbert Cooper, Trenton, New Jersey; John Patterson, Newport News, Virginia; Paul Gadsden, New York; Soutley Booker, Hampton; John Boardley, Philadelphia; James Fields, Elkland, Pennsylvania; Cecil Dayson, Jamaica, New York.

Army Needs 10,000 Nurses; Sounds Call For Volunteers

Greatly increased requirements of the Army Nurse Corps under wartime conditions were revealed by the War Department today with announcement that more than 10,000 nurses are needed to fill existing vacancies and those anticipated in the immediate future.

Major General James C. Magee, Surgeon General of the Army, issued a call for both Regular Army nurses and Reserve nurses. General Magee said:

"The estimated requirements for nurses in the Army for the next fiscal year called for a total increase of some 9,500 nurses to the professional care of the expanded Army under ordinary service conditions.

"But now that war has become a grim reality, the need of the armed forces cannot fail to become more acute.

"In the last war over 21,000 gallant women joined the Army Nurse Corps in defense of their ideals and their country. The crucial need which they so heroically served has been recreated by the brutal assault committed by Japan against the nation Sunday."

Regular Army nurses, General Magee explained, must be between the ages of 22 and 30 years, unmarried, citizens of the United States and women of good character who meet the technical requirements of their profession.

For the Reserve nurses, however, the age limit is from 21 to 40 with other requirements virtually the same.

Candidates for Regular Army nurse must meet physical requirements for Army nurses; they must be graduates of accredited high schools, a school of nursing of approved standards and also be registered nurses.

Reserve nurses must be unmarried, citizens, and physically fit, a school of nursing connected with a hospital giving a three years' course in basic nursing subjects. The hospital must have had a daily average of at least 50 patients and must have had separate departments.

FOODS FOR HER

We may honestly call the lemon a "real year 'rounder" or "a one hundred per cent fruit." Lemons are on the market all the months of the year. Thus, our favorite lemon pie is as easily made in summer as it is in winter. Likewise, a glass of hot lemonade for a cold, lemon juice for a stain, or lemon in a hair rinse is always obtainable.

In fact, the lemon actually goes the limit as a year 'rounder. The tree itself never takes a vacation. It is often possible to find buds, blossoms and fully ripened fruit on the same tree at the same time. No wonder the lemon pie is not a reasonable dessert.

Lemons are the only known source of Vitamin P, or citrin; and an excellent source of Vitamin C; a good source of Vitamin B; and lemons also aid digestion.

So, no matter when you read this, it's a reasonable time for any of those lemon recipes that have been put away in your file. Why not try one for tonight's dinner or tomorrow's lunch? Here's a favorite:

Lemon Shortcake
Beat 1 egg until very thick. Add 1/2 cup sugar and the grated rind of 1 lemon. Peel the lemon, removing all traces of rind. Then cut into small pieces, discarding the seeds and fibrous parts. Blend beaten egg, sugar, the rind, the juice and cut up pulp of the lemon and cool until serving time, at which time 2 tablespoons of cream are added. Serve between and over warm, split and buttered biscuits. A banana may be sliced into it for variety. (The quantities of sugar and cream may need revising to suit taste.)
