**Don't Burn Woods To Rid Premises Of Boll Weevil**

N. N. Nicholson not to burn woods in an effort to kill boll weevils. According to a recent statement by F. F. Bondy and C. F. Rainwater, federal entomologists at the Pee Dee experiment station at Florence, S. C., burning of woods is the most expensive and least effective method of destroying boll weevils. Boll weevils hibernate in many places where they cannot be killed by burning woods. Besides, the agent pointed out, often times valuable timber is destroyed by burning woods to kill weevils.
