the Negro soldier as a good worker — utilizing him under other fancy names showed the contempt which most of the brass hats have for Negroes.

The constant transferring from high posts of certain liberal minded white officers, who did feel that the Negro was due some consideration, giving these officers promotions to other duties, thus removing them from the actual contact which gave them keener pictures of what Negroes were doing.

All of these and many other incidents even more serious; assaulting Negroes in uniforms; Negro hating officers; ill-treatment of Negroes in southern camps; murders, beatings and injustices meted Negro troops, which the war department says the Negro press magnifies have had their part in causing resentment on the part of Negroes, high and low, and those holding offices as such want it generally known, they cannot be bought off while their fellows are suffering all sorts of ignominious treatment.

FORTY LEADERS

fully insist that the full delegation be permitted to attend with the understanding that not more than four persons will speak. Otherwise, we feel we must return respectfully."

When McNutt was adamant in his decision to see only four, this message was relayed to the group by a white newspaper man a former employe of the FECP from New York, named John Beecher, who was sent in to him. During the wait for McNutt's reply the list delegates present was checked against a list of former visitors last Friday to determine whether or not any were "repeaters."

Three names appeared on both lists and this is believed to have influenced McNutt's act which was relayed to Beecher by Mrs. Higgins, secretary to the commissioner.

Anger flared among the delegates when they discovered they were not going to be received. They were immediately hustled out of the auditorium in which they were waiting McNutt's decision and given a general brush off.

Reassembling at the Washington Bureau of the NAACP, the group quickly named a committee to draft a press release which was also to be sent to McNutt. On this committee were the original four spokesmen and one other person.

N. Y. WAR COUNCIL

The NAACP had asked for an investigation of the V-1 program in both the Army and the Navy departments but according to the Governor's office discrimination has occurred only in courses offered by the Navy Department.

The resolutions which was adopted at a meeting held January 19 by the New York State War Council included the following statements:

"WHEREAS, the War and Navy Department of the United States have deemed it desirable to utilize the facilities of certain colleges and universities in the

State of New York for the purpose of giving special training to men in the armed services, and

"WHEREAS, pursuant to the State Constitution and legislative enactments it is the declared policy of this State that there shall be no discrimination or segregation because of race, color or creed in the public schools and colleges or other institutions serving the public, and

"WHEREAS, colored citizens are freely admitted as students to the universities and colleges of the State for the regular courses of instruction and members of the student bodies of several of these universities

therefore, be it


"RESOLVED, that the State War Council of the State of New York express to the War Department and the Navy Department of the United States and to the War and Navy Committee of the War Manpower

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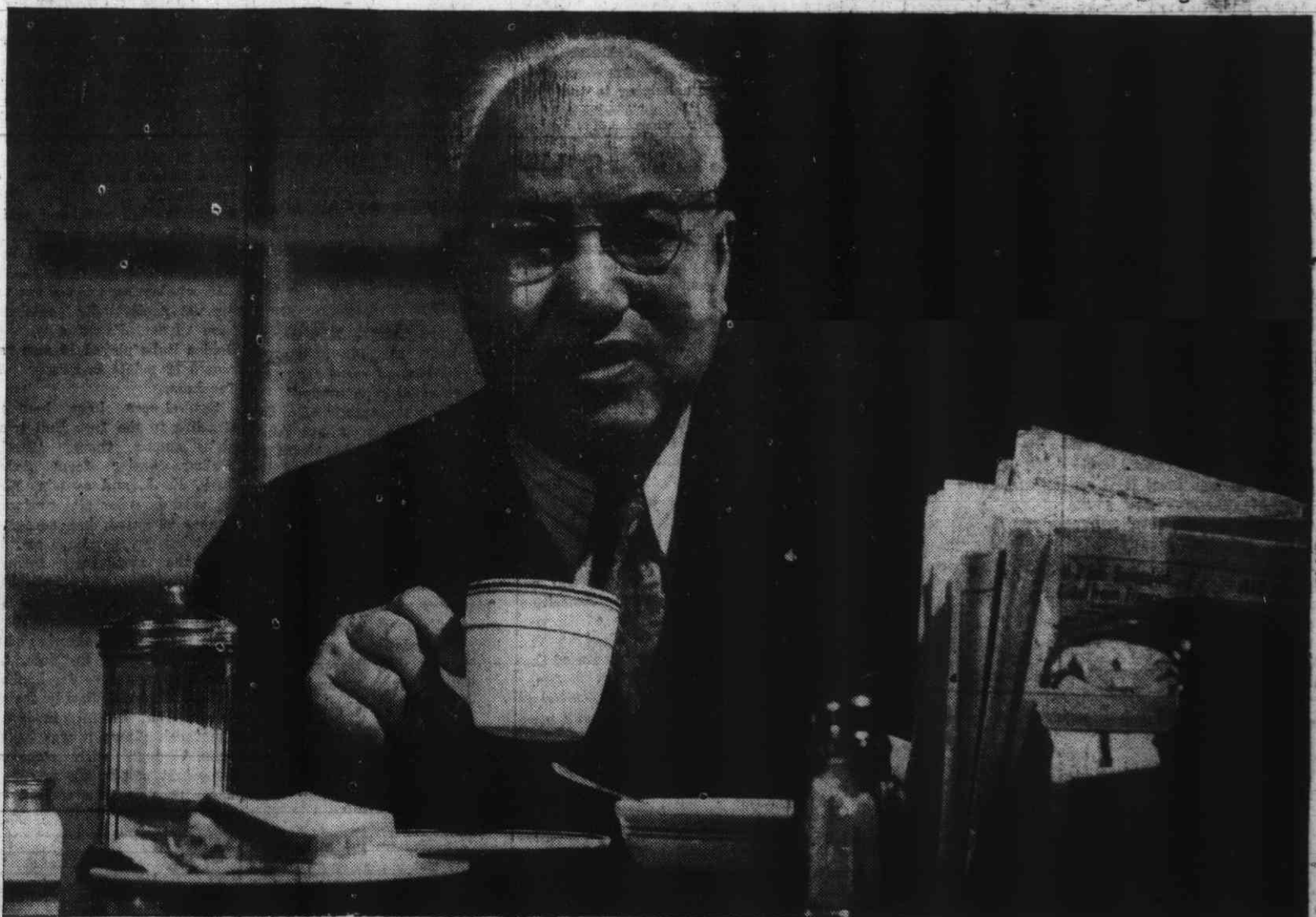
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
