Her Auxiliary rating is the WAAC equivalent of Private in the Army.

The new Auxiliary received her WAAC uniform and clothing and was given Army General Classification Tests during her first week in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps. She is now in Basic Training where she is learning Army routine and procedure.

At the completion of Basic Training, she will be assigned once to office or other work or will go to a WAAC Specialist School for additional training in office administration, motor transportation, baking and cook-or-radio to prepare her for one of the almost 100 different non-combat jobs which WAACs are doing in the Army. She also will have an opportunity to apply for officer training at Officer Candidate School.

Liberia) spending the night at the White House has the people of the south all wool-gathering. At one stage of his address Lloyd turned toward the whites who were present, saying, "white folks in this country are always trying to convince the
