JOURNAL AND GUIDE EDITOR APPOINTED TO IMPORTANT POST

WASHINGTON — President Roosevelt at long last has rounded out his Fair Employment Practice committee, and on Thursday noon he announced the names of the six persons who will work with Fr. Francis J. Haas, chairman to enforce the amended executive order No. 8802.

The new members, all representing industry, are Miss Sara Southall, supervisor of employment and services for the International Harvester company, Chicago; P. B. Young, veteran publisher of the Norfolk Va. Journal and Guide, chairman of the Southern Durham Conference on Race Relations, and chairman of the board, Howard university; and Samuel Zemurray, president of the United Fruit company, New Orleans.

The members of the old committee who were held over, all representing labor, are John Brophy, Congress of Industrial Organization; Milton P. Webster, international vice president, Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, Chicago; and Boris Shishkin, American Federation of Labor.

Earl B. Dickerson, Chicago lawyer and militant member of the original committee, was not among those reappointed. For sometime there had been some apprehension that he might be dropped.

No statement from the President accompanied the announcement of the names. There is a possibility that an official swearing in of the committee members might be held. Fr. Haas was in Detroit at the time of the White House release and could not be reached for comment or for a statement as to when he would call the initial off-meeting.

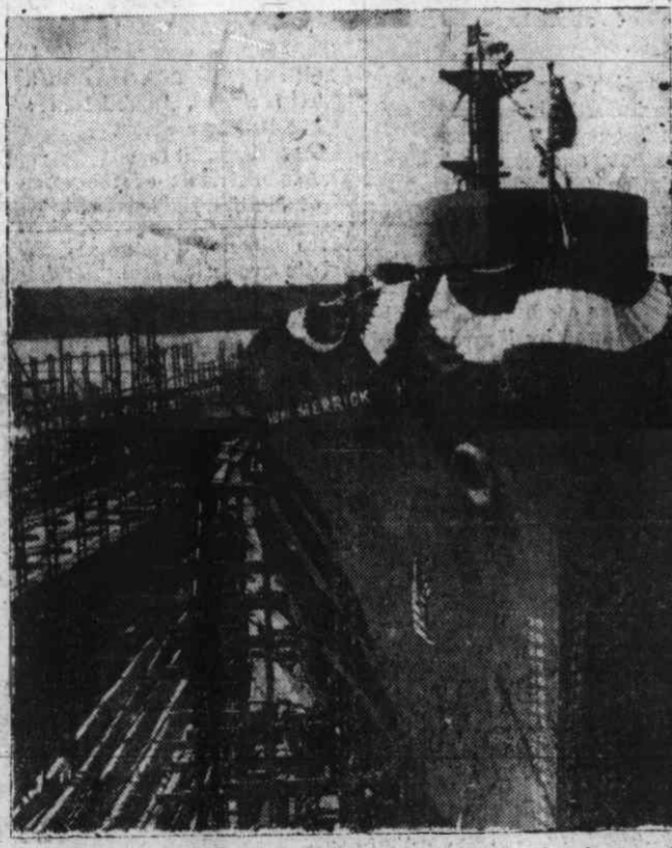

Commission Rules Laundry Worker Is Essential Employee

WASHINGTON, — Laundry workers are essential to the war effort and therefore eligible to the same preferential treatment now accorded other essential war industries under stabilization plans now in operation throughout the country.

The War Manpower commission has passed the word along to its regional directors with instructions to classify laundries as "locally needed." The new treatment extends to the referral of workers by the U. S. Employment service, protection from labor piracy and stabilization of their existing labor force, but does not provide for occupational deferment under the Selective Service act.
