#### Single Bargaining Unit At Reynolds

Winston-Salem—Aug. 11-Frank Hargrove, Chairman of the Tobacco Workers Committee, CIO, issued this staement this evening:,

"Through Donald Henderson, UCAPAWA-CIO President, I have confirmed my belief that the matter of the Reynolds elections will be settled with reasonable promptness by the National Labor Relations Board.

"It might, however, take several weeks. Since the Company and AFL entered protests of the elections already held, we took this opportunity again to enter a strong plea for a single bargaining unit at the Reynolds plant, feeling, as we have always felt that through one unit the workers can most effectively and fairly carry on collective bargaining.

"The Board well understands that interest is high in Winston-Salem and that final settlement of the case should be made at an early

"In view of the two to one for CIO in the elections, there can be no foubt of the outcome, whether the final arrangements is for a one or a two unit system."
