

Fayetteville Teachers College Begins Sixty-Sixth Year

FAYETTEVILLE STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE TO BEGIN 66th YEAR LARGE ENROLLMENT EXPECTED

FAYETTEVILLE — On Monday, September 13, the Fayetteville State Teachers College begins the sixty-sixth year of its continuous existence. This oldest of the five state supported institutions for Negroes in North Carolina first opened its doors in 1877 and it has continued without interruption since that time. A good sized enrollment is expected. The three women's dormitories will be crowded to capacity and there will be some young men returning. Many of the male students, however, have answered their country's call and are being found in various branches of the service. Lieutenants Ezekiel Tysor, Eugene Singletary, Charles Cherry and Claude Young have been recent visitors to the campus of their alma mater.

There will be several additions to the faculty this year to replace instructors who are now in the Army or transferred to other fields or who are studying. L. L. Boykin and J. H. Douglass will be away studying at Minnesota and Harvard, respectively, on fellowship grants from the General Education Board. Mrs. Mrs. Florence R. Brown returns after studying for a year on a fellowship from the Rosenwald Foundation.

Dr. J. Ward Seabrook begins

his eleventh year as president of the institution. He reports that the school is operating this year on the largest appropriation which it has ever received from the State Legislature. The increased allotment has enabled business management under the direction of William Jones to purchase new furniture and finish the walls and floors in some of the women's dormitories.

An intensive physical fitness campaign is to be launched for the women students. The campaign for the male students was started last year. A fulltime nurse has been employed and an employed and an additional woman instructor in physical education has been added to take care of the expanded health program. An intra-natural program is being planned to reach is being planned to reach every student in the institution.

The Newbold Training School, the practice teaching center, opens on September 8. A Latham Act nursery school for the two to five year olds has been added to the training school facilities so that the college students may see the principles of child psychology in action.
