We, the undersigned members in good standing of St. Mark African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, Durham. N C Central North Carolina Conference, Ninth Episcopal District, and representing a large number of St. Mark members similarly situated, respectfully submit the following complaint and petition for your consideration and adjudication:

For the past sixteen years the Rev. S. P. Perry has served as pastor of St. Mark Church. When he came to us, and during the early part of his administration. St. Mark occupied a place in the front ranks of the Churches in the city of Durham, N. C. Its ser-
