From R. N. Harris, Secretary-Manager, Bankers Fire Insurance Company, Durham: "I was not surprised at the decision of the Supreme Court declaring segregation in schools unconstitutional, for the decision was definitely foreshadowed by our own local school suit and by lower courts in so many cases concerning education at graduate levels. I am surprised and very happy at the unanimity of the court in the decision. The decision is of world-wide significance and will serve to demand respect for American justice in the courts of the world. My faith in America as the abode of men of good will leads me to the conclusion that the threatened storm and upheaval contemplated by some people will not materialize."

From J. S. Stewart, Secretary-Treasurer, Mutual Savings and Loan Association, Durham, N. C.: "The Supreme Court's decision declaring that segregation in public schools solely on the basis of race violates the Constitution of the United States lays the ground work for the extension of democracy all over the world. Any form of discrimination in the United States works against the best interest of this nation's program of selling democracy to other nations. The job has just begun and we cannot stop until all segregation and discrimination on the basis of race has been completely eliminated."

From Rev. E. T. Browne, pastor Mt. Vernon Baptist Church, Durham, N. C.: "The Supreme Court's recent decision...

raling is evidence that we have grown up."

Dr. Alfonso Elder, president, North Carolina College, Durham, N. C.:

"I believe that the Supreme Court's decision was wise and just. It is a decision that will pose many difficult problems. I am confident, however, that the citizens of North Carolina, white and Negro, will work out the problems involved in a spirit of mutual understanding and goodwill."

Dr. Charles A. Ray, director, the news bureau, North Carolina College, Durham, N. C.:

"I think that the decision was one to which all Americans are entitled. It carries with it a promise of educational equality that re-emphasizes the necessity of developing first rate students and teachers of unquestionable excellency."
