family had also tried to get the children in Orange County Schools "but when authorities there learned of the situation they were refused admittance."  
G. E. Brant, superintendent of schools at Holly Hill described the father as a "fine fellow" and the children as good students.

Brant said the family has Croatan Indian blood as well as a tribe by South Carolina law in 1887 after a dispute arose over their ancestry.

Their joint Indian-white ancestry dates back to 1587, when members of Sir Walter Raleigh's "lost colony" apparently intermarried with the tribe.

The Platt family came to Florida in October after selling their farm in South Carolina. Platt said that "It was so poor I couldn't make a living at it and take care of my big family." He is now working here as an Orange picker.

When the children were enrolled in Mount Dora's school the other students were told by teachers that the children were Indian and Irish. This was done after the sheriff began his "investigation" and the rumor began to go around the school that they were Negroes imported into Mount Dora to test the effect in face of the Supreme Court ruling against segregation.

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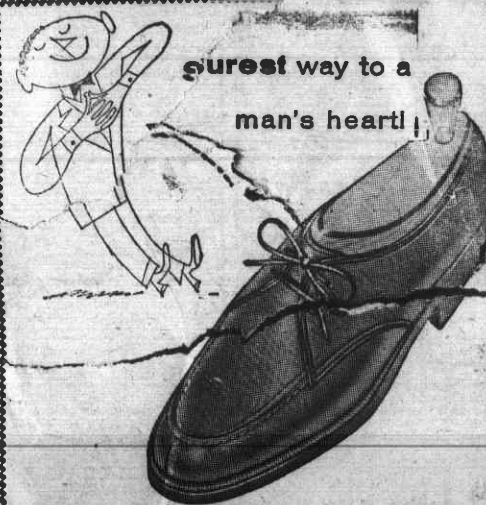
