Though cherries are linked with George Washington, his wife's recipe file did not include one for a cherry dessert. Nevertheless, one cooking historian of that era claims a cherry bread pudding was a favorite of Martha Washington's. So to honor this famous First Lady, Arnold Recipe Service has developed a recipe for our modern palates.

SPICY CHERRY PUDDING 1 can (2 cups) tart red cherries 2 teaspoons lemor juice 16 teaspoons constarch 16 cup water

2 eggs, well beaten 3 cup sugar 3 cup (3 stick) butter or mar-garine, melted 2 cups (4 slices) finely diced Brick Oven White Bread

Heat oven to 875° F. (moder-ste). Drain juice from cherries and place in small sauce pan with lemon juice and nutmers. Mix corn-starch and water together until amooth; stir into juice and cook until thickened. Combine with cherries and place in greased one-

duart baking dish. Best eggs, sugar and butter together; add bread cubes and mix well. Pour bread mixture over cherries. Bake, uncovered, for 35 to 40 minutes, or until nicely browned. Serve hot or cold with cream. Yield: 4 to 6 servings.
