### TO REMAIN IN CANADA Big John Brown, North

Carolina College's profe al gift to football in the U.S. and Canada, will not return to the U.S. A. in September to take a coaching position in a Southern college.

That's the word received here this week by close friends who are in position to know Brown's plans. The big, 245 pounder who weighs 246 and stands 6'4" was an all-confer-ence standont in grid and case ence standout in grid and cage circles when he played at NCC in 1947.

Brown, who comes originally from Gary, Ind., played with the Los Angeles Dons from 1947 to 1949 and he was a regular starter with the Win-nipeg Blues Bombers during 1950-1952 in Canada.

In between football seasons, Brown carned the master's de-gree in physical education at Northwestern University and worked as an appliance sales-man for a Winnipeg, Canada, firm. He is married and the father of a four year old daughter.
