

Dr. B. E. Mays Asserts, "Freedom Must Be Won"

Educator Says Race Has No Right To Freedom If It Does Not Win It

ATLANTA, Ga. — The Negro can expect no more than he is willing to work for, sacrifice for, sweat for," according to President Benjamin E. Mays of Morehouse College. "If we do not win our freedom, we have no right to it."

President Mays was this week's Assembly speaker at the Atlanta University Summer School. Participating in a series of forums on "You and the Local Community," he spoke on "New Opportunities, Expectations, and the Responsibilities of the Negro—1955."

Stressing the fact that opportunities carried with them responsibilities for the Negro, Dr. Mays said that every Negro should take the initiative to see that the Supreme Court decisions were carried out. "If we don't, we will be a segregated group for a long time to come."

Dr. Mays said that the Negro had the opportunity to participate in affairs of government as never before through the use of the ballot.

When the ballot was denied the Negro, he talked big and loud about the undemocratic government of America, but now that he has it, he does not use it. Dr. Mays found this a reflection on the intelligence of the Negro and his status in American society. "A person who doesn't register and vote, doesn't deserve freedom," he said.

Speaking of those who demand integration and yet want the protection of segregation, particularly in business, Dr. Mays said, "We will have to be prepared to meet the competition of an integrated society even with all the handicaps we have inherited from the past. He who starts behind must stay behind or run faster."

The Assembly speaker next week will be Dr. Emmett Dorsey of Howard University, currently teaching in the Atlanta University Summer School, who will speak on "Politics and the Local Community."

Will Explore Opportunities For Service

The opportunities for Christian services in the community, and the nation and world will be thoroughly explored at the AME Zion Church connectional council and board of bishops meeting in Chicago, July 28 through August 1.

On the community level will be reports of the general officers of the denomination. While these reports will be presented on a nation-wide basis, they will reflect the accomplishments of 3000 individual churches and indicate the work planned for the coming year.

On the national level will be addresses by Dr. William J. Trent, president, Livingstone College, Salisbury, N. C., and by Dr. James W. Dr. Trent will discuss "Zion in Education—Her Leadership and Institutions in the New Day" and Dr. Eichelberger will speak on "Racial and Religious Integration in Education."

World-wide Christian service will revolve the AME Zion's endeavors in the field of foreign missions. Rev. J. C. Hoggard, secretary of the Department of Foreign Missions, will clarify the church's position in his "Statement on Zion's Missionary Status." Raymond L. Jones of the seventh-episcopal district will go a step further in his "Foreign Missions and the Ecumenical Movement."
