RESOLVED THAT WE, the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Conference of NAACP Branches, respectfully request the Honorable Luther Hodges, Governor of North Carolina, to take whatever steps are necessary to remove immediately, Dr. I. Beverly Lake as an assistant North Carolina Attorney General, to repudiate his ill-conceived views and to urge all North Carolinians to act with reasonableness, promptness, and courage in the de-segregation of the State's public schools. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution

shall be sent to the Honorable William B. Rodman, Attorney General, to the Honorable Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court, and to Dr. 1. Beverly Lake, with the hope that Dr. Lake will be retired immediately to private life and there given every opportunity to make political capital out of his race-baiting tactics.
