### New Cookbook Offers "Date-Scotch Picnic Loaf"



Spry's new "Twentieth Anniversary Cookbook," just off the press, offers a timely picnic suggestion — "Date-Scotch Picnic Loaf." This delicious, generous-sized loaf is not only perfect for summer outings but is an ideal type of cake for use in school lunch boxes next fall.

Swirls of creamy butterscotch frosting, flecked with cut-up dates and chopped nuts, top this fine-textured, deliciously flavored yellow cake. Here's the recipe:

**Date-Scotch Picnic Loaf**  
 2-1/4 cups sifted cake flour  
 1-1/2 cups sugar  
 2-1/2 teaspoons double acting baking powder  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 3/4 cup Homogenized Spry  
 8/4 cup milk  
 1 teaspoon orange extract  
 1/2 teaspoon almond extract  
 3 eggs, unbeaten

Sift first 4 ingredients into mixing bowl. Drop in Spry. Add 1/2 cup milk, flavoring extracts, and 1 egg and beat 300 strokes (8 min. on mixer at low speed). Scrape bowl and spoon or beaters. Add remaining 1/4 cup milk and 2 eggs and beat 200 strokes (2 min. on mixer at low speed). Bake in Sprycoated oblong pan, 9" x 13" x 2", in moderate oven (350° F.) 40-45 min. Spread Date-Scotch Frosting on top of cake.

\*With a tartrate baking powder, use 4 teaspoons.

**Date-Scotch Frosting**  
 Combine in medium-sized saucepan: 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 3 tablespoons Homogenized Spry, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, 1/4 teaspoon salt; bring slowly to boil over low heat, stirring constantly. Add 1/3 cup milk, blend thoroughly, then bring to a boil and boil gently over low heat 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Cool slightly. Add 1-1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar and beat until thick enough to spread. Stir in 1/2 cup cut-up dates and 1/4 cup chopped nuts.
