



EULOGIZED IN THE SENATE

WASHINGTON, D. C In a ringing speech deliver ed in the Senate last Tuesday Senator Hubert H. Humphrey paid an eloquent tribute to the late Walter White as he reminded his Senate associate their responsibilities to end a once and for all time discrimination in America. Senator Humphrey's speech

in part follows:
"Mr. President, in these closing hours of the first session of the 84th Congress as we enact hundreds of bills, some very important and others less important, I am struck by the fact that there is one subject matter conspicuous by its absence on the calendar. I refer to the vital subject of civil rights.

"This has been an expensive."

In considering the status of the civil rights legislation in the Congress, my mind's eye recalls with great sadness the untimely death of the man who became the symbol of the struggle for greater democracy and human rights in the world, a distinguished American, Walter White, the Executive Secretary for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored Pco-
