

Capital Dr. Harry J. Walker of Howard University's Depart-ment of Sociology, and Dr. Roert T. Bower, Social Science Director at American University, presented an analysis of the Capital's first year of school desegregation, at a joint meeting of the Society for the Study of Social Problems and
