

# Virginia Union Chosen By Lott Carey As Site For Third Annual Meeting Of Young People's Seminar

WASHINGTON, D. C. According to the Rev. Wendell C. Somerville, Executive Secretary of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, the Third Annual Youth Seminar will be held at Virginia Union University, Richmond, Virginia, June 25-July 1, 1956.

The Lott Carey Convention has sponsored the two previous Seminars in the District of Columbia, where the Convention has its Headquarters' Building. Carefully selected youth from churches throughout the United States and the District of Columbia will participate in this outstanding youth conference.

The purpose of the Seminar as stated by Rev. Somerville is: "To give youth a world-wide view of current problems; to offer a Christian approach and technique in meeting these problems; and, to create and awaken in youth a sense of responsibility as Christians."

## Ala. Senate Kept From Hearing Explanation Of NAACP Position

MONTGOMERY, Ala. Seeking to read a communication from the NAACP in the Alabama Legislature here recently, Sen. Harlan G. Allen was ruled into silence by Lt. Gov. Guy Hardwick—who declared that the message was not germane.

The issue involved was that of a recording denounced as a "fake" by Roy Wilkins, NAACP executive secretary. The recording, which purportedly is of a speech by an NAACP organizer, was played to the Alabama Senate in January, on the request of Sen. Sam Engelhardt. Wilkins' telegram to the legislature explained that the recording was fraudulent and noted that correct information about the NAACP could be secured by any officer or committee of the legislature, by means of a written request to Association headquarters.

Later, Sen. Allen was told by Lt. Gov. Hardwick that he could rise to a point of personal privilege to read the NAACP message.

Sen. Engelhardt's comment regarding the Association's telegram was that it was an "obvious and expected defense to offer."

## SOLON SAYS 'RIGHTS' CAN'T BE DODGED

NEW YORK New York's veteran Senator Herbert Lehman reiterated his stand this week at the Roosevelt Day Dinner: that the Civil Rights issue cannot be ducked or dodged—particularly in the coming election.

"I know this issue cuts across party lines. I have heard the wish expressed that the civil rights issue be taken out of politics. That wish is academic. And those who wish it are reflecting an inadequate understanding of the inner workings of democracy."

Lehman served warning to his party and its leaders: "In this election, the people are going to vote on the civil rights issue. It is their only opportunity to express themselves effectively. It is the only way that anything, because there are not any."

## To Izaak Waltons' Wives, Or—Comin' Home With the Scales

By BILL BURNER—ANS Features DEAR MRS. WALTON: Does the sight of freshly caught trout, bass or ocean fish and your husband's "fishy" clothing (both ready for cleaning) make you wish you'd married a golfer or a horseman? Well, despair not, fair lady. Things are not as scaly as they used to be.

IN CLEANING the fish, whether it's to be scaled or skinned, filleted or not, knowing how is the answer. To scale a fish, use a dull vegetable knife and work "against the grain." By rubbing fingers over fish in same direction you'll find even stubborn scales are removed. Then, just clip off all fins at their base with kitchen shears, sever head and tail with a sharp knife, slit belly from head to tail, remove entrails and rinse thoroughly under cold running water.

SKINNING FISH calls for a sharp knife. Slit skin along middle back and across belly. Join just behind gills and use pliers to remove skin. Work from upper forward corner down toward tail. Remove fins, head, tail, entrails and rinse. Simple!

TO FILLET, slice into fish along one side of backbone, follow ribs down to end and bring knife to surface there. At rear of ribs, run knife around end of backbone to loosen tail fillet. Repeat same on other side. You should wind up with two completely boned halves.

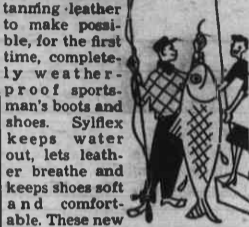
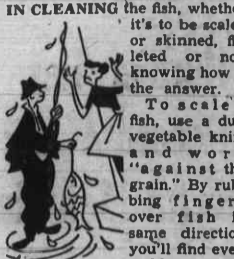

NEW YORK The student leaders and organizations at the University of Alabama "which have denounced mob violence" were commended this week in a telegram from Herbert L. Wright, NAACP youth secretary, to Walter Flowers, president of the University of Alabama student government.

Wright's message declared that "the shameful and abject capitulation to forces of violence and lawlessness has done much to discredit the University of Alabama among peoples throughout the world who believe in law and order and the democratic way of life."

The NAACP youth urged "student government and other responsible student organizations on campus" to not only "support Miss Lucy's readmission" but to "demand that she be given the same status as all other students, with full rights, privileges, and responsibilities thereof."

RALEIGH A statewide contest to pick North Carolina's best boy and girl school bus driver got official commendation today from Dr. Charles F. Dr. Carroll said a recently appointed 12-member committee of school superintendents had fully approved the contest which is now underway throughout the state.

District winners, in turn, will compete in the finals to be held in Chapel Hill sometime after the end of the school year.

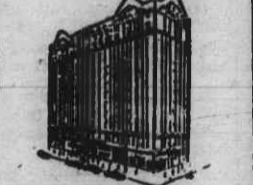
The winning couple each will receive a \$500 scholarship from the Governor's Traffic Safety Council in cooperation with the N. C. State Automobile Association.
