Rendition Of Beethoven Said Feature Of Kitty Sneed Recital

The recital by Miss Kitty Sneed of Durham given in the B. N. Duke auditorium on Sunday night May 21 brought to a close the series of senior recitals by music department majors.

Miss Sneed, whose area of specialization is piano performance, acquitted herself well in a short but taxing program which included a group of children's pieces by the South American composer, Villalobos, three works of Chopin, the well known variations of a Beethoven theme by Paisiello and the first movement of the Bach Concerto in D minor.

The young performer was perhaps at her best in the Beethoven variations, where she demonstrated a commendable clarity and precision of execution, portraying the contrasting moods of the several variations with genuine musicianship and remarkable insight.

Miss Sneed was given the loyal support of the members of her church, who made up a large portion of the appreciative audience which heard her. She is a member of Mt. Gilead Baptist church where she has continued her active membership during her college career.
