

Extension Workers Told Of Strides State Making In Program

GREENSBORO Extension workers, attending the annual State Conference here last week at A&T College, were told of the progress being made under the program being sponsored by the State.

D. S. Weaver, director, North Carolina Extension Service told the gathering of nearly 300 farm and home demonstration agents. "We already have set up the Program Projection Plan in 12 counties in the state and the remaining 88 will be operating before the end of the year. He said that it will not be long before every county in the State will have all of the projects in full operation. He was referring to Farm and Home Development, Challenge, Rural Development and Program Projection projects, all sponsored through the Extension aimed at improving improved agricultural practices and family living.

He urged the workers to encourage more livestock, poultry and milk production and stated that while a pretty good job is being done in milk production in the State, there is not yet enough being produced which could be used in dairy manufacturing.

The three-day meeting, in session at A&T for the first time in a long number of years, also featured lectures by R. W.

Shoffner and C. B. Ratchford, assistant directors, N. C. Extension Service and others prominent in the A&T Extension organization.

The group was welcomed at the opening session on Monday, May 14, by Warmoth T. Gibbs, president of the college. R. E. Jones, State agent, is in charge of the group.

(Continued from Page Two) rate stocks and bonds and the obligations of state and local governments.

In addition, individuals added \$6 billion to the value of their insurance last year. They put close to \$30 billion into the purchase of homes and the plant, equipment, and inventories of unincorporated businesses and farms. Even when you allow for the increases in mortgages, consumer and business debt that individuals incurred during the year, and for property depreciation which is constantly taking place, individuals' savings still added up to about \$17 billion in

1955. In spite of this remarkable record of savings last year, however, individuals saved a little less than in 1954, which in turn was a little lower than 1953. Personal savings are accounting for only about 6-1/2 percent of our income after taxes now, as against an average of about 8 percent in other recent years. This is disturbing and is a further indication that we are not saving today quite enough to finance the rapid rate of growth of which we are otherwise capable. We need to develop thrift and encourage it by attractive rewards. This is one of the objectives of the Treasury saving bonds program which is celebrating the 15th anniversary of the E bond this month. Your institutions are enlisted in this same endeavor.

We are looking to the savings institutions of America to help further the dynamic growth of our Nation through the encouragement of greater individuals' savings. If individual investors in Savings Bonds and in all
