Johnson correctly interpreted the proposal by the Democratic National Committee to set up a national "advisory com-

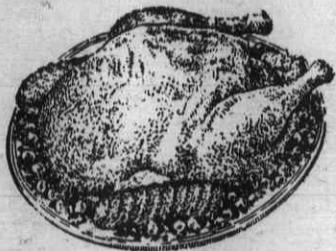
