

Shriners Convention Will Be Confronted By Unique Problem - How To Disburse Over \$300,000 In Grants

The problem of giving away medical foundation and ear-money—nearly \$300,000 to be marked for medical research, exact—will be one of the biggest of the agenda when the 57th annual convention of the Ancient Egyptian Council of the Ancient Imperial Order of the Shrine meets in Chicago on August 17-22. With a total of \$296,271.48 already allotted to the Shriners

upwards of \$123,000 have been given away for scholarships and medical research in cancer and tuberculosis. But after deciding upon a one-year period of re-appraisal last August while convening in Philadelphia, the group has now lifted the restrictions to include grants for research purposes in all phases of medicine. Any institution or individual can receive as much as \$5,000 annually if they apply to and are approved by the Shrine Tuberculosis and Cancer Research Foundation. As one of the most generous groups supporting America's charities, the Prince Hall Masonic affiliated Shrine group has, in the past, given away as much as \$46,800 to one Negro hospital alone to aid in medical research. This was to Wendell Phillips Hospital in St. Louis, Missouri, which received grants in 1951, 1953 and 1954 for a Shrine cancer clinic. Others who have been recipients of Shrine grants are the American Cancer Society, \$15,000 in 1950; Freeman's Hospital of Washington, D. C., \$20,000 for research in tuberculosis; and the Carver Research Foundation at Tuskegee Institute, Ala., which has been awarded two grants of \$3,800 each for cancer research.

Aside from assessments imposed upon each of the Shriners' 15,800 member organization and their ladies' auxiliary, the Daughters of Isis, one of the biggest sources of revenue for the charitable project is the Shrine Talent and Beauty Pageant. Since 1950, a total of

\$32,000 has been awarded to young ladies who have been winners of the Talent and Beauty Pageant, perhaps the largest among Negroes in the U.S. To date, scholarship awards have been used at the Chicago Music College; Juilliard School of Music in New York; Wayne University School of Music in Detroit; Traphagen School of Fashion Design in New York; Howard University at Washington, D. C.; Hampton Institute, Hampton, Va.; Carnegie University in Pittsburgh, Pa.; Oberlin College, Oberlin, Ohio; New York School of Drama; Tillotson College in Austin, Texas; and St. Francis School of Nursing, Columbus, Ohio.

Race Theme Movie Lauded

"Kings Go Forth," a Ross-Eton Production starring Frank Sinatra, Tony Curtis and Natalie Wood, has been awarded the 1958 Los Angeles Urban League Award as the motion picture that "does most for the promotion of better race relations and understanding." Nat "King" Cole presented the gold plaque to Frank Ross, producer of the film which was made on the French Riviera. Ross accepted on behalf of himself and Frank Sinatra who was unable to attend the ceremonies. Ross received the award before leaving for France at the weekend.

Urban League members were consulted by Mr. Ross in the handling of the inter-racial aspects of "Kings Go Forth," a love story set on the French Riviera during World War II in which Natalie Wood portrays the daughter of an inter-racial couple. The film, which will have its world premiere in Monaco on June 14 for the benefit of the United Nations Refugee fund, will be released in this country by United Artists in July.

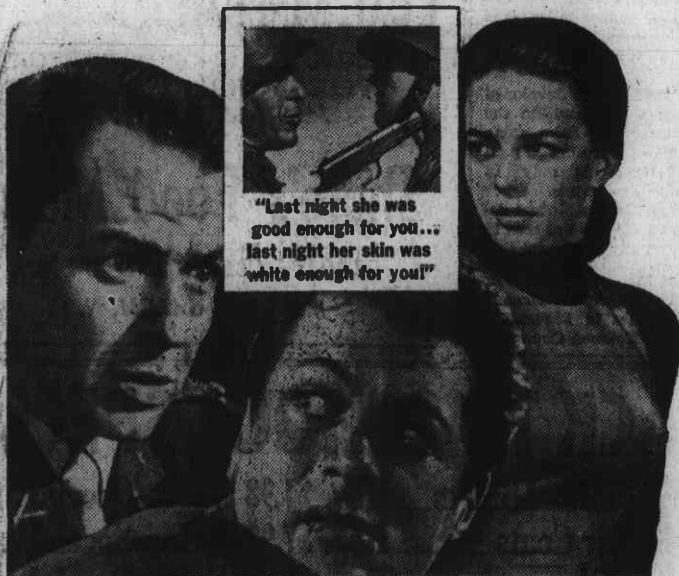
