English Expert To Air Problems With Students

Miss Lorene Novotny, a specialist in problems of junior and senior high school English, will discuss composition and creative writing problems with some 50 teachers from a 10 county area at North Carolina College on Friday, February 20.

C. H. Ferguson of the State Department of Public Instruction in Raleigh says the program has been arranged to give a fuller interpretation of the materials presented in the State adopted textbooks for English in our schools.

"Miss Novotny will make helpful suggestions concerning the use of the State adopted texts, 'Building Better English' and will lead a discussion of the problems of English teachers," Ferguson said.

Miss Novotny is associated with Row, Peterson and Co., publishers of the state adopted texts in English.

She received her B.A. degree in English from the University of Nebraska and her M.A. from the University of Kansas.

Kroger Workers Get Bonus In Savings Plan

ROANOKE, Va. — Kroger employees received additional credits of \$1.00 for each one of their own dollars they saved under the company's profit sharing and retirement income program during 1958, it was announced Friday by Paxton C. Judge, vice president of the Roanoke division of the retail food firm.

A portion of company profits is credited to the accounts of employees in proportion to the amount each has saved during the year, Judge explained.

More than \$224,945 was credited to the profit sharing accounts of 812 Kroger employees in the Roanoke division area during 1958. During the same period, their savings totaled \$148,799.

In the seven and a half years the profit sharing program has been in operation, the fund has grown to \$39,717,683 as of December 27, 1958. Contributions from company profits plus earnings of the fund during that time, totaling \$20,499,498, actually have amounted to more than total employee savings and earnings of \$19,218,195 during the same period.

The Ideal Driver

The ideal driver—like the ideal anything—doesn't exist. If he did, he would earn his title with motoring practices like these:

He stays alert at every intersection—even if he has the right of way—and slows down if necessary.
