Tarheel Farm Economy Moving From Dependence On Tobacco

GREENSBORO—North Carolina agriculture is moving away from a total tobacco economy and our future is limited only by our own shortcomings," a farm meeting at A&T College was told last week.
The speaker was George Wyatt, Jr., head of the Department of Animal Industry at State College, Raleigh, who delivered the banquet address at the 11th Annual Dairy Production Short Course held at the College, February 4-6.
He spoke from the subject, "Animal Industry Looks to the Future." "North Carolina and the Southeast face a brilliant future if we continue to rid ourselves of ignorance and outmoded custom and traditions."
Referring directly to the section's rapidly developing animal industry he listed as other important needs, more and more reasonable credit, a willingness by the farmer to adapt to necessary changes, clearer vision to see the possibilities and a willingness to cross state lines with the idea of moving into the national economy.
"We need not worry about what is to come," he continued, as much as we can brag about from where we have come." He said that the income from livestock in this state had increased from thirty million dollars in 1925 to 122 million in 1946 to 207 million in 1958.
"With tobacco out, animal industry now accounts for more than one half of the income from all other agricultural sources accruing to North Carolina farmers," he added.
Wyatt was introduced by Dr. W. L. Kennedy, chairman, Animal Industry Department at A&T College. Other persons appearing on the program included: M. L. Cunningham, representing the Greensboro Chamber of Commerce; J. M. Marteen and Rev. Cleo M. McCoy, both of the A&T staff. Dr. Warmoth T. Gibbs, president of the college, presided.
Walter Martin, Mount Olive and William Hunt, Macon, were awarded first and second prizes, respectively in the contest for the best dairy production records. The awards were presented by B. W. Harris, director of Short Courses at the college and in charge of local arrangements.
During the three-day meet, the dairy farmers were brought up-to-date on the latest methods of modern dairying through lectures and demonstrations presented by prominent experts in the field.
The Short Course was sponsored, jointly, by the College and its Extension Service.

The major qualifications for being appointed as Danforth Teacher are: Outstanding academic ability and evidence of a vigorous, searching mind; a personality which contributes to constructive, creative effort in the classroom; sound character and integrity, and serious inquiry within the Christian tradition.

Miss Smith is a native of Monroe, North Carolina and attended the public schools there. She received the A.B. degree (Cum Laude) from North Carolina College in 1944 and the M.A. degree in Literature from the University of Pittsburgh in 1949. She is working toward the Ph.D. degree in English at the University of Pittsburgh.

The Danforth Foundation was established in 1927 by Mr. and Mrs. William B. Danforth of St. Louis. It was their intention that the Foundation should serve the needs of young men and women particularly their educational need, with special emphasis upon the cultural and spiritual aspects of education. Toward this end, the Foundation confines its activities very largely to the area of higher education with special attention to the recruiting and training of Christian teachers in all fields.

Five New Study Programs Start This Summer At Hampton Institute

HAMPTON, Va. — Five special programs will be features of the summer school curriculum at Hampton Institute during the regular summer session held on the college campus from June 15 to August 7, according to an announcement by Dr. Hugh M. Glover, director of the summer session.
The summer sessions, each offering courses leading to a Bachelor's or Master's degree, are divided into three, five or eight week terms with classes being held six days a week.

The workshops will be held on the Mentally Retarded Child, Audio-Visual Aids, and a Theatre workshop. Other courses will be the Teaching of Reading, Principles of Speech Correction and Therapy, and Science for Elementary School Teachers.
