

## Civil Rights Commission Sets Up Advisory Unit for Hawaii

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Commission on Civil Rights has appointed an Hawaii Advisory Committee composed of eight persons, Dr. John A. Hannah, chairman of the Commission, has announced. Of the eight, three are of Oriental ancestry.

Joseph V. Hodgson, a Honolulu attorney and former United States representative on the United Nations War Crimes Commission, was

named chairman of the Hawaii group.

## Agriculture Workers from 14 Southern States Talk On Ways of Adapting Program for Changed Economy

DUBLIN, Ga.—Forty-nine Negro Extension Service supervisors from 14 States met in a regional workshop last week here at the 4-H center to take a fresh look at their job in view of the changing agricultural economy of the South.

Principal speakers at the workshop were: Dr. E. B. Evans, president of Prairie View, Texas, A&M College; L. I. Jones, field representative of the Federal Extension Service; Director M. O. Watkins of

the Florida Extension Service; Miss Eselle Gaddis, State home demonstration agent of Mississippi; Dr. Grady W. Taylor, district agent of Alabama; Director W. A. Sutton of the Georgia Extension Service; and P. H. Stone of the Federal Extension office who directed the workshop.

The speakers described the vast changes which are taking place in agriculture and rural life: Farms becoming larger and fewer, mechanized and specialized with increased emphasis on livestock. Other changes include higher educational level of farm people, a decline in home production of food and clothing, and a tendency more and more to purchase such items.

It was pointed out also that the schools are being consolidated, the number of rural non-farm families is increasing, and the concentration of farm people by age groups is tending to fall among the young and the old.

Following the addresses, the supervisors, who direct the work of more than 800 farm and home demonstration agents, met for three days in small workshop groups to analyze their Extension programs and make adjustments to help meet the changing needs of rural people.

It was suggested that supervision be broadened to provide for more effective recruitment, placement, and training of agents, and more careful surveillance of program planning and program execution.

In line with the changing agricultural economy, the farm demonstration supervisors placed increased emphasis on adequate family-sized farms, higher efficiency, pasture development, and livestock production.

Taking a look at today's rural home, the home demonstration supervisors said more work needs to be done in the areas of family relations, consumer buying, and home management. And they suggested that more research on the

status of Negro farm families should be undertaken.

The 4-H leaders expressed concern over the decline in club enrollment among pupils at consolidated schools. Emphasis was placed on organizing out-of-school clubs in the local communities. Some thought was given also to the development of new 4-H projects, such as baby sitting and suburban and urban yard beautification.
