**GREENSBORO**—The State Agent of the A&T College Extension Service will be cited today (Tuesday, May 26) by the USDA Department of Agriculture.

R. E. Jones, in charge of the Extension Service here at the college since 1943 was scheduled to receive the Superior Service Award, one of the highest honors available of professional workers in Agriculture, in special ceremonies at Washington, D. C., this morning.

The presentation ceremonies were set for Sylvian Theatre on the Washington Monument Grounds beginning at 10:30 A. M. Jones, a 1933 graduate of A&T College, holds the M. S. **GREENSBORO**—The 72nd annual meeting of the Old North State Medical Society to be held here at A&T College, June 9-11, will draw the largest delegation in the history of the organization.

Meeting simultaneously with the medics are the Pharmacy Section and their woman's Auxiliary and the total turnout for the three groups is expected to exceed 300 persons.

An outstanding array of prominent physicians and surgeons will appear before the medics in scientific sessions set for the second day of the meet on Wednesday, June 10.

On Thursday the doctors and pharmacists will hear lectures on "Death Taxes - State and Federal" by James J. Sanson, Jr., assistant cashier, Mechanics and Farmers Bank, Durham and "Rising Costs of Hospital Care" by John G. Scott, Memorial Hospital, Chapel Hill.
