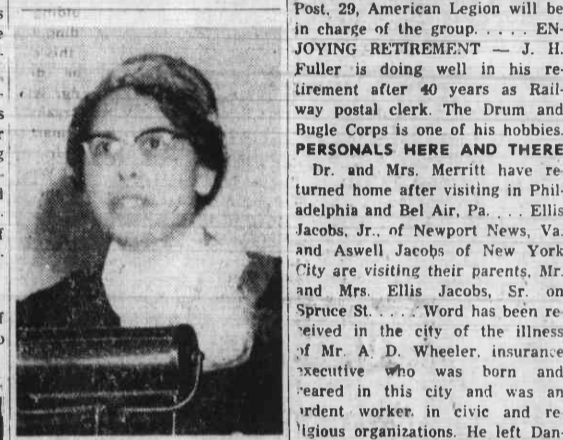


## Danville News Notes
