Morris Brown Pins NCC Eagles In Saturday's Pigskin Opener 13-6

Morris Brown's Purple Wolverines overcame a first quarter deficit to whip North Carolina College 13-6 here at O'Kelly field Saturday afternoon before some 3,000 fans witnessing both teams' debut.

Andrew Pinckney, Wolverine quarterback, was the individual star of the show. The Georgetown, S. C. senior hit on 6 of 12 aerials, one for a TD pass to halfback Charley Bolden.

The day started off badly for Pinckney, however. In the first quarter he fumbled a handoff on his own 22. Walter Browning, NCC fullback, recovered and set the stage of the Eagles' only tally.

Efforts proving futile to crack the Wolverines forward wall, the Eagles sprang halfback Rossie Barfield loose on a fourth down power right play. Action carried to the Wolverines' 10.

Three plays advanced to the two yard line. Browning powered over from the two. On the conversion try, quarterback Reginald Pryor's pass to end George Wallace was short.

Coach E. J. (Ox) Clemmons crew marched 65 yards in the second period for their first TD. Pinckney's seven yard pass to Bolden made the count 6-6. Tackle

Four Classics on Tough 8-Game Schedule For Morgan State Bears; Meet W. Va. State In D. C.

Broncos Eye Win Over Pirates In Opening Tilt

FAYETTEVILLE — That this is just about as good year as any to shake off the "losing jinx" that plagued them during the whole of last season is the opinion shared fully by Football Coach Herbert "Hubie" Douth, his assistant, Coach Page P. Saunders, and the Bronco footballers on masse.

A quiet, determined sort of seriousness of purpose has settled down upon the boys as they go through their daily drills. But the coaches continue to caution, "We have a long way to go". Therefore drills calculated to condition the race and stress the fundamentals remain a big segment of the daily menu down the Fayetteville way.

Despite the fact that last year's line is, essentially, the same, definite weaknesses are apparent and it is these shortcomings and others in the backfield that keeps the coaches on the "worried list."

The quarterback position, a major headache from the outset, remains wide open. The most likely candidates for the spot are Earnest Norman, a freshman from Mount Airy, North Carolina and Statesville, North Carolina's George Wilson, a sophomore. Each is a good ball handler and each has been impressive in pre-game drills.

Captain "Big Charlie" Johnson playing his last year of collegiate football has been a splendid performer to date. He is fast and alert both at tackling and blocking. And likewise has Frederick Rodgers, out for his fourth consecutive letter, in football shown up impressively in the daily practice sessions; he is a fine blocker and a man who can get down the field in a hurry.

Eugene "Red" Hunter, a starter at end from last year's squad has come through as the team's "most improved" flankman and sophomore Thomas Rowley, always running hard, comes in as the Bronco pack's most improved back so far.

BALTIMORE, Md.—The 14-time champion Morgan State College football Bears are scrimmaging towards the opening of what their veteran coach Eddie Hurt calls "one of the most exciting schedules we've faced in years."

Four classics plus generally strong opponents have combined to put added interest in the eight game Morgan schedule which kicks off when the Bears meet the North Carolina College Eagles Oct. 3 at Durham, N. C.

T. P. Harris Is President Of Nat'l Ins. Assn.

CHICAGO, Illinois — Thomas P. Harris, president and general counsel of the Chicago Metropolitan Mutual Assurance Company, has been installed as the 40th president of the National Insurance Association which held its annual convention here recently. The installation ceremony was held on September 4.

In an address of acceptance, Mr. Harris expressed appreciation for the honor bestowed upon him by the members of the Association. The NIA is comprised of more than 50 companies located in states throughout the country. The new president pledged to carry on the work of the Association in connection with its officers and members.

Noting that the NIA is the strongest economic organization, Harris proposed a study of "ways of utilizing our considerable investments for the economic advancement of our race." In order to achieve our organizational goals, he said, we need a sharing of responsibilities and wholehearted cooperation.

The new NIA head has been president of the Chicago Metropolitan Mutual Assurance since 1956 when he succeeded the late Robert A. Cole. He first joined the company as general counsel in 1932 and was elected to the Chicago Metropolitan Board in 1934.

Harris is also a member of the board of directors of the Drexel National Bank of Chicago, with assets in excess of \$30,000,000.

For the Bears, the classic of classics is their October 10th meeting with Vernon (Skip) McCain's Maryland State College Hawks.

Billed as the All-Maryland Classic, the intra-state rivalry will be played in Baltimore's Memorial Stadium, 9 p. m., with the Bears fighting to retain the WEBB Radio Station Trophy they won last year by whipping the Hawks 13-12. In their only other meeting, the Bears and Hawks, clashing as CIAA opponents for the first time, fought to a 7-7 deadlock.

Something new in the way of classics for the Bears comes when they meet Hampton Institute in Portsmouth, Va., on Nov. 14 in the Fish Bowl, while the something old will be the traditional Thanksgiving Classic with Virginia State College on Nov. 26, season closer for the Hurt-men. This game will be played in Morgan's Hughes Stadium.

Not quite. The little Morgan mentor feels the Bears ought to develop into a pretty good team if the quarterback position is properly filled.
