NCC Graduates Urged to Challenge "Conscience Of the Nation" in Speech by Brooklyn Minister

Dr. Gardner Taylor, one of the U. S.'s top preachers, urged some 400 candidates for undergraduate, graduate and professional degrees at North Carolina College's 49th Commencement exercises here Sunday, to challenge the "conscience of the nation until America is a democracy."

"We must assume the responsibilities and discharge the obligation of citizenship while challenging the conscience of the nation," Dr. Taylor said.

"The United States government needs to be carrying on a nationwide program intelligently administered by experts in the field of group attitudes," the New York cleric and member of the NYC City Board of Education said.

"If Madison Avenue can change the image in a person or a business, it can actually change the face of the nation in its outlook upon equality and integration, given money and cooperation."

"Failing this, and with such cases as the list of the black martyred dead before it, this nation ought to make some reparations to its Negro citizens."

"Call the roll: Harry T. Moore, martyred in Florida for freedom; Emmett Till dead, bloated, and buried for winking at another human being; Rev. George Lee, slaughtered in Mississippi for wanting to vote; Mack Charles Parker, lynched and unavenged with the details of the crime known; the murderers' identities documented and the whole apparatus of law and order of the United States paralyzed and mute."

"One is tempted to suggest that in the light of the above, the United States Government ought to refund to every Negro income tax payer in America that portion of his federal income tax which is used for those agencies which protect the civil rights of citizens, since the Negro community apparently is not covered by these provisions."

where men assay to govern themselves. We Americans originate in many creeds, colors and climes. We are the earth in miniature. Americans, black, white, do not realize the awful, and awesome responsibility we bear in history, trustees of the noblest political hopes that have come to be a part of the legacy of the human family. Repeat them carefully and you will tremble at the great words with which we entered into contract with history. "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal." "One nation indivisible with liberty and justice."

"We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, to establish justice . . . secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity do ordain and establish this constitution." "Four score and seven years ago our father's brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal." Special features will include: Swimming parties, movies, city tours and Glee club singing, story hours and devotions.


