NCC Prof To Address Nation's Top Educators

In its annual meeting in Daytona Beach, Florida, May 31-June 4, the National Conference for State Departments of Education will hear an address by Dr. Theodore R. Speigner, director of the division of Resource-Use Education at North Carolina College at Durham.

The invitation to Dr. Speigner was extended by Dr. George L. Fersh, director of the Joint Council on Economic Education, New York City.

Dr. Speigner, an authority in the field of Conservation and Resource-Use Education, will speak on the topic, "What can be Done Through Statewide Resource-Use Education Programs to Improve Quality of Instruction."

State superintendents of public instruction, commissioners of education, curriculum specialists, supervisors of conservation education, specialists in science and mathematics, and economists from fifty states will attend the Florida meeting, which will be held at the Daytona Plaza Hotel.

The purpose of the meeting, according to Dr. Fersh, is "to provide for an exchange of ideas, practices, and materials in the field of Conservation and Resource-Use Education."

Dr. Speigner's distinction is exhibited by long years of experience, research, and publishing in the field of Conservation and Resource-Use Education. He heads the division at NCC and directs the statewide program, which has expanded under his leadership from a service-area of 10 Piedmont counties to 75 counties throughout the state.

His doctoral dissertation was based on an analysis of Resource-Use Education in North Carolina and the South.
