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Movie and stage beauties have special glamour secrets for the summer, and it is spelled hat... the most glamorous way there is to stay pretty when it's broiling hot outside.

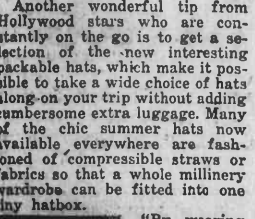
