

He explained that the plan calls for 18 acres and that a little more han four acres are now sened commercial. They are neeking commercial zoning for the re-maining 14 acres.

Stubbs reminded the Council that decision is due by July 12, as the law requires a roling on rezoning petitions within 00 days of submission. The petition was filed on April 12.

Speaking in favor of the center was Alfred Fisher, a city teacher who lives in the Mutual Heights rea. He said: "I am buying home in that area and we need a shopping center there. We den't want to hurt the businessmen of the Hayti area, we want to en-courage them to come down to the new center and serve us.
