RICHMOND, VA.—The Richmond branch of the NAACP has issued a formal protest over the arrest earlier this month of the State NAACP executive secretary Lest-er Banks for refusing to leave the lining room of a railway station.

The protest was sent in the form of a letter to Lynchburg Mayor William C. Vaughan.

Banks was arrested on Oct. 16 in the dining room of the Norfolk and Western Railway station where he had requested service.

When Banks protested to arresting officers that he was entitled to service there under the recent ICC banning discrimination in inter state travel facilities, Lynchburg police reportedly they knew noth inder Virginia law which required segregation at the station.
