Boy Scout Troop 55, Formed In 1932, Is The Oldest of Units In The Durham Scout Division

White Rock Baptist Church appears to be in "granddaddy" of scout centers in the Durham area as it boasts two of the oldest units in its division.

Boy Scout Troop 55 and Cub Pack 55, both affiliated with White Rock, are forerunners in scouting in their respective category. Explorer Post 129, My. Vernon Baptist Church, was the first Explorer Post to be organized in this area.

Troop 55 was organized July 23, 1932 as Durham's first boy scout troop for Negro boys. William G. Pearson '11, James Carrington, William Powell and Ray Tillman took a six weeks training course in scouting while students at Hillside High School, and upon completion of this course, organized the troop.

Powell became scoutmaster with Pearson and John A. Spaulding as his assistants. The troop, first sponsored by the citizens of the Hillside Park Community, had as its troop committee Frederick C. Davis, chairman, James W. Carrington, Ray Tillman and J. N. Mills. Dr. Harry Evans served as advisor and instructor for the troop.

With 18 members, troop meetings were held in the Royal Knights Building at 809 Fayetteville St., until 1935 when they moved to the White Rock Church. The sponsorship of the troop was transferred to the church two years later.

The original 18 members of the troop included Weldon Bradshaw, William Bullock, John Cordice, George Cox Jr., Henry W. Gillis, Wonta Gomez, Silas Jones Jr., George Logan, Jr., J. U. Lowe Jr., Henry Marshall, Clinton Mills, Burley Paige, David Parham, Charles Rogers Royal Spaulding, Garland Spaulding, James Small and Lonnie Thomas.

Since its beginning, Troop 55 has had four Scoutmasters. Present Scoutmaster is N. B. White. The following men have served as Assistant Scoutmasters: W. G. Pearson, John A. Spaulding, Clarence Palmer, William Morrison, James Green, J. U. Lowe Sr., N. E. Walker, William Hill, Odell Fields, Jules F. Jackson, Raymond Williams, Silas McAllister, Clarker Egerton, Jr., Edward B. Boyd, Charles A. Alston, W. A. Hennessee, Bennie O. Holman, and George D. White Jr.

There have been five National Jamborees in the United States and Troop 55 has been represented at each one of them. In July, 1960, fourteen scouts from Troop and Post 53 attended the Jubilee Jamboree at Colorado Springs, Colo.

Unemployed Farm Workers In Texas Get Assistance From USDA

Migratory and other farm laborers in three Texas counties, left without work by freeze damage to crops, are being helped immediately with USDA-donated foods, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced last week.

This step, the Secretary said, is in line with recommendations by the President's Committee on Migratory Labor to maximize use of USDA's special food program to assist migratory workers and their families.

Cameron, whose county seat is Brownsville, and two other south Texas counties, Hidalgo and Willacy, have been hit by snow and freeze that wiped out much of the citrus fruit crop and vegetables ready for harvest. It is estimated that from 15,000 to 20,000 persons in the three counties need emergency food assistance. Most of those in need are migratory workers and their families.

Food currently available for distribution include canned chopped meat, whole dry milk, flour, cornmeal, rice, rolled wheat, peanut butter, dry beans, butter, cheese, and lard. These are being shipped from two State warehouses in Houston and Corpus Christi.
