**ATLANTA STUDENTS STAGE PROTEST WALK AND PICKET**  
ATLANTA, GA.—More than 100 students from the Atlanta University Center this week staged a protest walk and picket line around the Georgia State Capitol here.  
Two groups of Negroes and whites had tried to sit integrated in the House and Senate Galleries. Negroes going to the House Gallery were told that they didn't have to have passes, but when a white teacher from Spelman College, Dr. Staunton Lynn, sat with them, three State Troopers asked him to leave. Dr. Lynn told the Troopers that he had no pass, and therefore sat in the unreserved or all-Negro section. When Lynn was asked to leave, the whole group left.

**JOB UNIT DISAPPOINTS NORTH CAROLINA NAACP**  
CHARLOTTE, N. C.—The 155 delegates attending the annual meeting of the North Carolina State Conference of NAACP Branches here this week voted unanimously to register their "disappointment and dissatisfaction" with the President's Committee on Equal Employment Opportunity.

**SNCC SECRETARY ARRESTED AT SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY**  
BATON ROUGE, LA.—Dion Diamond, a Field Secretary of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, was arrested here today when he stepped from a taxi onto the campus of Southern University.  
SNCC Field Secretary Diamond was arrested by Southern University Campus Police. Although he had been invited to the campus by Student Body President Murphy Jackson, he was charged with "trespassing and disorderly conduct." His bond was set at \$4,000.

**BIRMINGHAM AIRPORT RESTAURANT INTEGRATED**  
BIRMINGHAM, ALA.—The Dobbs House Restaurant, which opened on January 29th in the Birmingham Municipal Airport, was integrated this week by Rev. Wyatt Tee Walker, Execu-

tive Director of Dr. Martin Luther King's S. C. L. C., and William Kunstler, American Civil Liberties Union lawyer of New York City.  
The two men arrived in Birmingham to attend a Federal hearing on a writ of habeas corpus seeking the release of the Rev. Fred Shuttlesworth and the Rev. J. S. Phifer.

**ACLU MAKES APPEAL IN BEHALF OF ALA. NEGRO**  
NEW YORK.—The American Civil Liberties Union this week urged a federal appeals court to rule that a Negro was denied a fair and public trial because it was conducted in a racially segregated courthouse.  
"Segregation within the halls of justice mocks the judicial process and the entire trend of current Supreme Court opinion," the civil liberties group asserted in a friend of the court brief on behalf of Willie Seals, Jr. "This is a frontier question in the law," the ACLU said.  
Seals, a Mobile County, Alabama, Negro, was convicted in 1958 by an all-white jury of raping a white woman and was sentenced to die.

**METHODISTS TO TRY TO INCREASE MEMBERSHIP**  
NASHVILLE, TENN.—The Central (Negro) Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church will try to increase its church membership by ten percent during a Bishop's Evangelistic Crusade in the jurisdiction March 11-18.  
Membership of the Central Jurisdiction, which covers most of the United States, is now 387,340, according to the Rev. Dr. W. D. Lester, Nashville staff member of the Methodist General Board of Evangelism. In addition, several thousand Negro Methodist are members of churches in other jurisdictions of the denomination.

**N. J. CORE MEMBERS ARRESTED IN CITY HALL SIT-INS**  
INGLEWOOD, N. J.—Eleven CORE members were arrested early this week after an all-night sit-in at Englewood City Hall to protest de facto school segregation.  
Bond was set at \$10 but all refused to pay and thus remained in jail. CORE organized a picket line outside the city jail in support of those arrested.

**Approaching the Market**  
Experts dispute how best to approach the Negro market. Professor Henry A. Bullock of Texas Southern U. argues that Negroes resent as condescending the use of Negro models and specially adapted radio programs. He advocates a broad appeal that sells to both whites and Negroes, such as Revlon's use of Negro Singer Harry Belafonte on TV.

Since 1954 to determine whether white opposition to Supreme Court decisions had "snuffed out" newly-won gains of Negroes in the police field, or whether Negro policemen had "become a permanent and increasingly important part of the southern scene."  
Rudwick found that Negro officers still were subject to discrimination in that many agencies forbade their men to arrest white offenders; failed to award credit and promotion on a scale equal with white officers; and usually assigned Negro officers "exclusively to Negro neighborhoods."

Canada. The U. S. Negro population, which now stands at 19 million, is increasing 57 percent faster than the rest of the nation.

From Camel to Dodge, many big U. S. advertisers now substitute Negro models in their ads for Ebony (cir. 700,000), the nation's leading Negro magazine. According to Time, last year Ebony carried ads from 57 of the nation's top 100 advertisers. Another barometer: 20 years ago, only three U. S. radio stations offered programs tailored to Negroes. Now more than 600 do.

Miss Bonner said the chief and another patrolman started to pull him away by the arms when Frink asked what was wrong. She said the chief then replied he was arresting Frink for "illegal picketing."  
According to the girl, as Frink was about to protest the charges the chief smashed him in the mouth with his fist, and hauled him off to the police car. She continued:  
Frink dropped his hat as they were about to get into the car and apparently reached for it. At this point, the chief hit him in the back with his knee, forcing him into the car, and drove away.

Frink has been charged with resisting an officer, assault on a police officer and illegal picketing. He was released on a \$250 bond. His case is scheduled to be tried in Magistrate's Court next week.

Shortly after Saturday night's incident, the picketers reported that whites grouped up before he theater box office began shouting, "go home nigger," and throwing small articles at them. Fearing mob violence, they abandoned the picket lines.  
On Sunday, they wired the Justice Department for an investigation and early this week requested protection from Governor Sanford.

automobiles to the Ford Motor Co. line because they associate Ford with Ford Foundation philanthropies which have benefited Negroes.  
"One of the major fears of companies today," says Market Adviser Gibson, "is that if they go after the Negro market they will lose white customers." Gibson thinks that this is silly.  
"Even in the South there is evidence that white people do not care what companies do to cultivate Negro business as long as it doesn't interfere with their way of life. Marketing a toothpaste is not the same as encouraging a Negro to come to a fashionable hotel."

The sophistication of appeals to the Negro market is increasing, but still leaves much to be desired. Says Frank Seymour, general manager of Detroit's Negro radio station WCHB: "Too many advertisers have failed to grasp a simple point: ask the Negro for his business with courtesy and respect. Don't talk down to him and cut out the Amos 'n' Andy bit." Like many marketing experts, however, Seymour believes that the progress the U. S. Negroes are making toward economic and social equality will eventually make special appeals unnecessary. He predicts that within 15 years Negro radio stations will die out. "I guess," says he wryly, "we're going to fall victims of progress."
