## Lincoln Grad Posts Record High Exam Score

A 1962 graduate of Lincoln hospital's nursing school recorded one of the highest scores ever posted in the North Carolina State Board Examinations this fall.

According to information received by the hospital from the State examiners, Mrs. Martin scored 714 points out of a possible 800 on the obstetrics section in the state nursing examination.

## New Sandburg Book to Mark Poel's Birthday

NEW YORK — Carl Sandburg will mark his 85th birthday on Sunday, January 6, with the publication of a new book HONEY AND SALT 77 new poems celebrating, with his customary vigor and affirmation, the themes he has become famous for during half a century of creativity. Both Governor Otto Kener of Illinois and Governor Terry Sanford of North Carolina have declared January 6, as Carl Sandburg Day.

HONEY AND SALT will be the 35th book that Harcourt, Brace and World has published by Carl Sandburg since he first appeared on their list with THE CHICAGO RACE RIFLES in 1919, the year the company was founded.

Since then Sandburg has twice won the Pulitzer Prize in 1940 for History with the publication of ABRAHAM LINCOLN: THE WAR YEARS and in 1951 for Poetry with the publication of his COMPLETE POEMS.

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
