First, according to a survey of civil rights efforts in State Legislatures this session.

The NAACP survey covered the following states: Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, Nevada, New York, Oklahoma, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Vermont and Wisconsin.

In seven of these states housing and jobs were accorded top priority in the NAACP legislative program. Five state units worked primarily for legislation guaranteeing equal access to public accommodations. Three sought omnibus civil rights legislation. There was also NAACP support for minimum wage legislation.

Among the more notable NAACP legislative victories reported so far this year was passage of a bill prohibiting discrimination in places of public accommodation such as hotels and taverns in South Dakota.

Powell Says He's Only Free Leader

NEW YORK — Harlem Congressman Adam Clayton Powell asserted last week that he is the only Negro leader entirely free of white control because he is not dependent on whites for financial support.

"All my strength, all my money come from Negroes," Powell declared, "and therefore I cannot be controlled by whites."

Powell's remarks were quoted in an article, "The Audacious World of Adam Powell," in the current issue of Look Magazine.

The controversial Congressman stated that there is no other Negro leader or organization that does not get "substantial money" from whites and added: "I don't need it."

Powell described himself, according to the article, as "an irritant" who "rubs and rubs until something gives."

Recently critical of the NAACP for letting whites hold positions of leadership in the organization, Powell was asked to comment on reports that many of his ancestors were white.
