DOOMED BOY'S MOM GRATEFUL FOR AID
LYNCHBURG, Va.—"If it were not for you people I don't know what I would do," Mrs. Willie Mae Thornton told a mass meeting sponsored by the Wansley Defense Fund. Mrs. Thornton is the mother of Thomas Wansley, 18, who is under two sentences of death for alleged rape of a white woman and a Japanese woman. Her statement was made after she read to the gathering a letter written by her son. He is in the Death House at Richmond, Va., awaiting execution on June 7. In the letter young Wansley asked his mother to "tell Grand mother that I am going deeper into the Bible." He wrote Mrs. Thornton after she visited him recently. "He looks well and seemed to be in very good spirits," his mother told the assemblage of ministers and other white and Negro supporters. She later told a reporter about her son's deprived background. His father died several years ago and she remarried. Wans dropped out of school at 16, when he was still in the 6th grade. He had done fairly well in his studies but got behind because he was absent so much. This resulted from a chronic scalp ailment which the family did not have

Durhamite to Study Abroad

SALISBURY — Miss Betty J. Verbal, history instructor at Livingstone College has been granted an award for study abroad this summer through the U. S. State Department and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Washington, D. C. She will go to Paris, France to join a seminar on French writers of European history at the Institut d'Etudes Politiques at Paris. Miss Verbal was chosen among the 20 educators tapped for this grant for overseas study. Tentatively she plans to leave the country June 24, and return around the first of August. Following completion of her study period, Miss Verbal hopes to tour France in an effort to become more familiar with the country, its political structure and people. A native of Durham, Miss Verbal is a graduate of North Carolina College where she received the B. A. and M. A. degrees.

Augusta NAACP Asks Integration

AUGUSTA, Ga. — NAACP leaders in this deep southern town are demanding full integration of public facilities and schools in an aggressive but peaceful manner not often witnessed in this region. The Rev. C. S. Hamilton, vice president of the Association's Georgia organization and president of the local NAACP here, wrote Mayor Millard Beckum last year concerning "conditions in the city." This communication had not been aired before the city fathers when a delegation of Negroes, under Hamilton's leadership, appealed to the City Council earlier this month. "We do not have any recreational facilities for Negroes. We want total integration of all public facilities in and around Augusta and Richmond County."

Kroger to Give 66 Scholarships

CINCINNATI — A total of 66 Kroger scholarships for freshman students in agriculture and home economics will again be offered at land-grant colleges in 23 states for the 1963-1964 school year, it was announced recently by Joseph B. Hall, chairman of the board of the Kroger Co. Twelve Negro land-grant schools are among the 37 colleges where the grants are available. Two new schools were added this year, Hall said. They are the University of Minnesota and the University of Maryland. The scholarships, which are for \$250, are available at land-grant colleges in midwestern and southern states where there are Kroger stores and in California and Florida where Kroger fruit and vegetable buying offices are located. Any graduate of an accredited high school is eligible. Application should be made directly to the college. Scholarship winners are selected by the scholarship committee at each college and the school will notify winners by mail. Kroger scholarship awards will be made on the basis of scholastic standing in high school as well as leadership in school, church or youth groups. Financial need may also be considered.

The NAACP is barred from activity in Alabama by a sweeping state injunction now being challenged in the Federal courts, but NAACP officers can accept speaking engagements in the state as long as they do not solicit support for the NAACP or engage in anything which the state considers "business."

CLARKSDALE, Miss. — Contractors began work, April 19, to repair the \$1,000 bomb damage to the home of Aaron E. Henry, president of the Mississippi State NAACP. The Henry home was fired by a flaming "Molotov cocktail" hurled through the window early on the morning of April 12 at a time when Congressman Charles C. Diggs of Detroit was a guest in the home. Diggs was in Mississippi to investigate local efforts to deny Negroes the right to register and other civil rights. The following day two young white men were arrested — Theodore A. Carr, 24, and Luther A. Cauthen, 26. They told police that they had thrown the lethal homemade bomb as a lark and were unaware that Representative Diggs was stopping there or that their target was a Negro home.

Repairs Begun on Bombed Home
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Eighteen Finish Welding Course
WISE — Eighteen adult farmers of the Vocational Agriculture Department of the North Warren High School successfully completed a twenty-hour course in Farm Arc Welding recently. This course was authorized by the State Department of Public Instruction and was administered through the Industrial Education Center at Wilson, in cooperation with our local superintendent's office. Funds for the instructor were made available by an appropriation made by the 1961 State Legislature for the operation of a program of Agricultural Technology Education for the purpose of training agricultural members in the non-farming agricultural occupations to meet the demands of modern technical agriculture. These courses are operated through the Industrial Education Centers in cooperation with Agricultural Departments which have adult farm classes.

Wilkins Hits Denial of Negro Kids in Florida

NEW YORK—Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the NAACP,

returned from a mid-western tour this week during which he deplored the government's education of Cuban exiles in Miami while denying the same to Negro citizens. The NAACP executive spoke in Denver, Colo., and Des Moines, Iowa. He stressed that housing and employment are still serious problems to Negro citizens in that area, especially in the small towns. Wilkins was escorted on the brief tour by Leonard Carter, regional NAACP field secretary.
