Talks on Better Use of Literature Made Before Home Ec. Teachers

BELCROSS — The vocation of Home Economics teachers of District I met at Marion Anderson High School in Belcross, April 25 with Mrs. Woodhouse hostess and Mrs. E. L. King chairman.

Suggestions for more effective use of current books, periodicals, pamphlets, and bulletin board displays was the topic for discussion.

Mrs. Gloria Jones suggested how to find the latest books that can be helpful in teaching Home Economics. Many new reference books were brought for viewing which would be helpful in supplementing the text books.

Miss Thelma Miller introduced ways of using periodicals in the class-room suggesting also the use of many of the current magazines by setting aside a period for student browsing. She brought an improvised T. V. that students would be interested in not only viewing but also supplying information for viewing.

Miss Daisy Bembrey showed display of filing materials so

that students could find them easily. These materials had been catalogued and filed in the 7 areas of Home Economics with bibliographies for each area. Mrs. Loretta White gave many uses for bulletin boards pointing out that they should be stimulating and challenging, should establish a point, clarify facts, excite imagination. It may be used to give the child the total picture of a unit or one days work plan, explanation of a specific part of a lesson, may display student work notices. In preparing any bulletin board principles of art should be applied, it should be attractive, have purpose and should be changed often.

Miss Chance evaluated the professional meeting for the year - what one gains depends on the individual's attitude. One should be openminded, receptive and frank. Many teachers have brought ideas which were pooled and shared at the meeting.

Miss Razlan brought a tape on Interpreting Home Economics To The Public and Miss Whitfield gave expressions of hospitality to the hostess from the group. Remarks were given by the Area supervisor, Miss Augusta White stressing the importance of getting reports in on time and points to remember in closing the department for the year.

Hillside Hears Duke Professor

Dr. Walter R. Guild, associate professor of biophysics at Duke University, was guest lecturer in the biology II class of T. M. Davis at Hillside High School last Monday morning.

Dr. Guild's lecture was centered around the area of heredity on the transmission of genetic information stored in molecules of DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid).

The Duke University scientist just recently completed research, along with a medical student collaborator, on the DNA possibilities of transmission, and made reports and described findings on their research at the annual meeting of the American Federation of Societies for Experimental Biology held in Atlantic City, N. J.

Dr. Guild explained how he separated two strands of DNA by spinning DNA molecules for four days in an ultracentrifuge. The DNA came from a drug-resistant strain of bacteria.

Hillside biology students have been currently studying the DNA molecule, and invited Dr. Guild to share his research experiences with them.

Kyle Schooler, chairman of the biology class, introduced the lecturer, and T. M. Davis, instructor, offered a word of thanks and commendation to Dr. Guild for his research work following the presentation.
