(Continued from front page) the students and asking that a new school be built.

The petition said: (1) Present conditions under which our children attend school are dangerous to life, limb, health and general welfare in that the children, being of young age and curious by nature, could suffer injuries to their person;

(2) That the condition under which classes are attempted to be conducted are not the best in interest of the children, in that the children are in school less than six hours a day.

(3) That the split shift operation of the school results in inconvenience in homes of children especially in the morning; and

(4) That the parents desire that a new and adequate school be built using the standards recommended by the Southern Association of College and Schools and the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction.

The school was partially destroyed by a fire last week which gutted the old main section of the school. The fire was admittedly set by a 16 year old Merrick-Moore school boy Jesse Trice, who said he did it to get even with a teacher who had angered him.

City school officials announced after an inspection of the site that classes would be resumed on last Monday on a split shift basis with all students attending school in two newly built and relatively undamaged wings of the school.

School parents, who are protesting the split shifts, say they would prefer having the children transported to other schools where space is available. They pointed out that three elementary schools in the area, Fuller, Holloway St and East Durham, all have classrooms which currently are not used and which could be used to house the displaced East End students until the end of the present term.
