Continued from front page through in the field. "see" as Humphrey put it, "the program through." He said he would be watching them "over the transom."

The various panel sessions that followed in the afternoon covered Health and Welfare, Agriculture and Rural Area Development, Federal Aid Program, Manpower, Housing-Community Development, Education.

All was not necessarily peaceful at the panel sessions, as some members of the audience, who have been fighting for civil rights in the South these many years, thought the business of "equitable procedures" before Funds are cut off "too much delay and too little segregation." At the panel on elementary and secondary education, Aaron Henry, president of the Mississippi NAACP, noted (quickly) that none of the panelists as headed by James M. Quigley, Asst. Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare was a Negro.

Verbal fireworks flew for awhile as a special assistant in the Federal anti-poverty program stated that the remarks served no purpose. Then came a counter-answer from Clarence Mitchell, Washington Bureau chief of the NAACP who said that "The Jackson Daily News (Miss.) could come up here and take a picture and state 'Why didn't you folks desegregate the panel before you ask us to desegregate?'"

Continued from front page laws protected by the Fourteenth Amendment.

More than 250 searches of Negro homes, churches and public places were triggered by a Christmas Eve holdup of Luxie's Liquor Store, resulting in the shooting of Lt. Joseph Maskell and the slaying of Sgt. Jack Cooper. Both are white police officers. The Baltimore police are searching for Samuel and Earl Veney, sought as the "Veney Brothers" who are accused of conducting the holdup and shootings. They are Negro.

Legal Defense Fund Attorneys Juanita Jackson Mitchell and Tucker R. Dearing, of the Baltimore NAACP, and James M. Nabrit, III and Director-Counsel Jack Greenberg, of the Legal Defense Fund New York City, contend, in their complaint that the police: "...beat upon the front door of the homes of the plaintiffs with loud banging noises in the early morning hours, focusing the beams of strong search lights upon their homes, and with drawn guns entered the homes and did the following acts, among others:

* They aroused the plaintiffs from their sleep, caused them to rise from their beds, and placed them and their children in great fear.

* They searched all rooms and closets of the house, including the basement, and left without any word of explanation for their acts.

* None of the plaintiffs have been charged with any crime or offense.

In the city of Baltimore, there has been a constant outcry coming from the Negro community, many of whom believe that this type conduct, during a search, was only sanctioned because it was within a Negro area.

Commenting on the statement by Commissioner of Police, Bernard C. Schmidt, defendant in the action, when he said the Negroes who had been searched showed "excellent cooperation," a local newspaper editorial said:

"It is the same kind of 'excellent cooperation' the Jews gave to Hitler's storm troopers when they came with pistols, shotguns and machine-guns and violated their rights."

Legal Defense Fund Attorneys have asked the District Court to enjoin the Baltimore police from: * Continuing or resuming the practice of making unlawful entries and searches of the homes and persons of plaintiffs and others similarly situated without lawful search warrants;

* Harassing threatening, (or) intimidating any such person because they protest, object to, or resist such unlawful entries and searches;

* Counseling or advising any person to do any of the acts mentioned herein.

Presently, witnesses for the defenses are scheduled to be heard by the District Court before giving its decision.

In the last decade, Dr. DuBois, who was sent to Germany in 1951 by the U. S. State Department to train teachers and social workers in methods of inter-group relations, has adapted her techniques of group conversation to the needs of small church and community groups. To date she has attended over 300 meetings in scattered cities over the nation, at the request of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers).

Working with Dr. DuBois, Mrs. Mew-Soong Li also brings a rich background to SCLC's department of Operation Dialogue. Born in Hawaii, she has served on the faculty of the New School for Social Research in New York. She received her first degree in social work at the University of Hawaii, later did graduate work at the University of London. In 1964, she worked as a specialist in Psychodrama at St. Elizabeth Hospital in Washington, D. C.

The two eminent specialists in group dialogue will take up offices in Dr. King's Atlanta headquarters on Feb. 10.

Continued from front page of formal training for nonwhite workers. Some 51 percent had not gone beyond the eighth grade, the corresponding proportion for all workers, white and nonwhite, was 32 percent. Conversely, only 32 percent of the nonwhites, but 46 percent of all workers, had taken any formal training.

Among older workers, barely one-fifth of the nonwhites had training, compared with about three-eighths of the whites and nonwhites together. The largest differences occurred among men with less than 8 years of schooling, and among women high school graduates, as shown in chart 3. The latter finding may be evidence of the "ceiling" effects of job discrimination.
