RICHMOND, Va .- A native of Henderson, North Carolina, Dr. Rachel Henderlite, was ordained the first woman minister of the Presbyterian Church, U. S., in ceremonies here Wednesday

Holder of a doctorate in Christian ethics from the Vale University Divinity School, Dr. Henderlite was instated before an audience of some 300 persons-about one half white and one-half Negro -at her home church, All Souls Presbyterian Church. She is 59 years of age.

Stith's charges were review ed at a City Hall meeting Wednesday, after which officials said "there was no suggestion of voting irregularities.'

The alleged violations took place at Burton, Hillside, Pearson and Whitted precincts in Ward Three. Among charges were passing out literature close to polls, the use of a demonstration yoting machine to persuade voters in favor of a candidate, and verbal campaining too close to the polls.
