FREE PUBLIC USE DOCUMENTS ARE NOW AVAILABLE

GREENSBORO — The Internal Revenue Service announced today the availability of two cost-free, public use documents, Documents No. 5592 (3-65) deals with Retirement Plans for Self-Employed Individuals. It contains guides for qualification of pensions, profit-sharing and bond purchase plans which include self-employed individuals.

The other document available is entitled "Tax Benefits for Older Americans" and is referred to as Document No. 5569. It contains a resume of the changes made by the Revenue Act of 1964 as they pertain to individual taxpayers who are 65 years old or more. Of particular interest are the additional tax benefits for older Americans in computing their medical deduction, their retirement income credit and in computing whether the gain on the sale of a personal residence is includable in income.

Both of these documents are available at Internal Revenue's 22 field offices in principal cities throughout the State.

Boys Scouts Hold 55th Annual Meet in Florida

MIAMI BEACH, Florida — The Boy Scouts of America held its 55th Annual National Council Meeting May 20-21 at Bal Harbour Miami Beach at the Americana Hotel.

Business on the agenda included the election of officers and members of the national executive board and the national council; reports and review of the 1965-67 program of emphasis, "Breakthrough for Youth"; and presentation of the Lorillard Spencer Trophy for the outstanding Scout program of 1964.

The Lorillard trophy was awarded at a banquet May 21 at which Col. John H. Glenn, Jr., was the featured speaker.

Serving 5,585,700 members registered in Cub Scout packs, Boy Scout troops, and Explorer posts, the Boy Scouts of America has as its basic purposes, character building, citizenship training, and physical fitness. The program is administered by 12 geographic regions within which are 523 local councils and 2,800 districts and more than 1 million adult volunteers on a do-over 3,000 full-time professional Scout leaders.

The organization was founded in 1910. Total membership since its founding is expected to pass the 40 million mark this year. More than 90,000 community organizations operate one or more Scout units, and as chartered institutions provide meeting places, unit leadership, and administrative direction to operate their units.

NAACP Protests Federal Funds to Biased Hospital

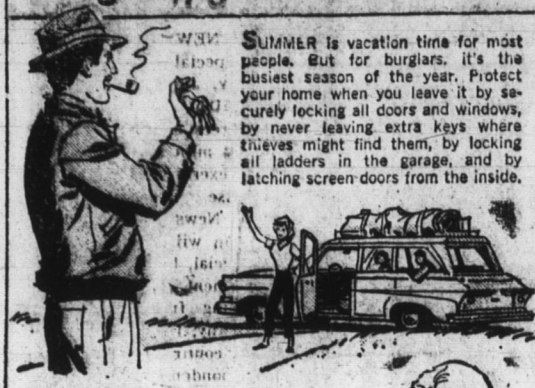
SAVANNAH.—In its continuing campaign against the use of Federal funds in segregated hospitals in the South, the NAACP has lodged a vigorous protest against a public health service grant to the Chatham Co. Nursing Home here.

In a letter to Anthony J. Celebrezze, secretary of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, W. Law, president of the Savannah NAACP and a member of the NAACP Board of Directors, stated that if the \$195,000 grant "was made on the basis of an investigation from a Regional Office official in Atlanta, it is a clear indication that the regional office itself... is in very serious need of investigation."

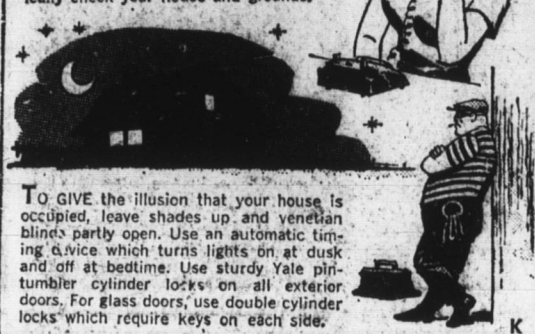
Law stated that the Nursing Home is not in compliance with the Civil Rights Act as it maintains separate dining rooms for Negroes and whites, separate wards and has "no Negroes serving in a clerical or supervisory capacity."

In recent weeks the NAACP has lodged complaints against many hospitals in several southern states which receive Federal funds for their maintenance. Under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act, these funds may be cut off if the hospitals have segregated facilities.

THIS SUMMER Burglar-Proof Your Home



SUMMER is vacation time for most people. But for burglars, it's the busiest season of the year. Protect your home when you leave it by securely locking all doors and windows, by never leaving extra keys where thieves might find them, by locking all ladders in the garage, and by latching screen doors from the inside.



WAIT until after you return from vacation before notifying the local police of your trip. Arrange by phone to have milk, mail and newspaper deliveries stopped. It's safer than leaving notes that a thief might read. Ask neighbors to accept packages for you, and request the police to periodically check your house and grounds.

To give the illusion that your house is occupied, leave shades up and venetian blinds partly open. Use an automatic timing device which turns lights on at dusk and off at bedtime. Use sturdy Yale pin-tumbler cylinder locks on all exterior doors. For glass doors, use double cylinder locks which require keys on each side.

D'ye ken the Scots o' Canada?



OTTAWA (CFN)—There's no heather on the hills in Canada, but the flower of Scottish tradition is deeply rooted in Canadian soil. Every summer it blossoms forth in a surge of bagpipe music, and a swirl of bright plaid. This is the season of highland festivals in Canada.

Predictably, those held in Nova Scotia—or New Scotland—are among the most authentic. Pipe and dancing competitions are a highlight of the July "Gathering of the Clans" in Pugwash. At Antigonish, even homegrown sports like golf and bowling are performed in kilts.

The famous Gaelic Mod, at St. Ann's, Cape Breton Island, offers a special bonus—a highland dance instructors' course, where "would-be" highland swingers can pick up valuable pointers.

Prince Edward Island—Canada's "wee bit of a province" on the east coast—still nurtures its Scottish roots. Every August, the MacLeod Clan holds a gala "family reunion" at Charlottetown. Highland

Games at Eldon, held this year on August 4, are another main event.

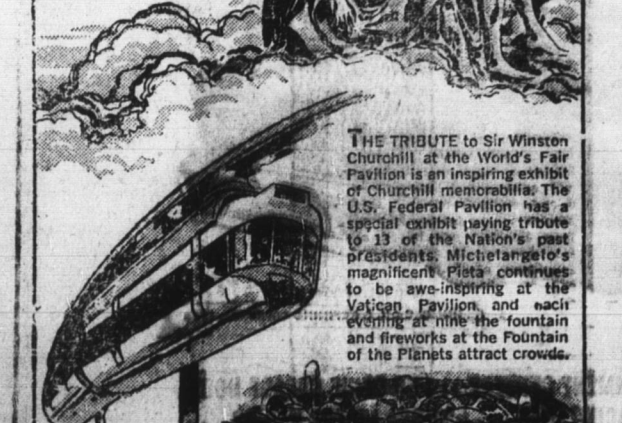
Ontario celebrates its Scottish ancestry with the largest assortment of highland festivals in Canada. Brantford features a double heather—with games in both June and July. But the best known highland festivals in Ontario are Maxville and Fergus—frequently opened by clan chiefs from the old country. The Fergus games has the largest massed band parade in the world.

In British Columbia, highland festivals are an annual event at Nanaimo, Nelson, Portion and Victoria. As for Vancouver—Caledonian Games have been held there every summer since 1886.
