## NCC Students are Chosen For Summer Service Projects

Four North Carolina College students and one recent graduate have been selected to participate in summer service projects sponsored by the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. Two of the participants will work in New Jersey, two in Ohio, and one in Michigan.

Otis Jones, a sophomore sociology major and psychology minor from Wake Forest, will go with Sherle Boone, a sophomore, also of Wake Forest, to a neglected neighborhood in Camden, N. J., where they will work out of an old tavern building called "The Point." The Point will also serve as a residence for the students who will aid citizens of the area through teaching, leading recreation, doing indoor and outdoor work, in addition to studying and taking part in research and interviews.

A junior from Kinston, William Cheeks, will be a member of an activity entitled "Presbyterian Neighborhood Services" in Detroit. There he will be part of a team of eight students who will be headquartered in the Detroit Presbyterian's three neighborhood houses. Emphasis will be placed on

the education and development of indigenous leadership in the areas served. Further activities will include day camps, vacation church schools, house visitations, teenage programs, and the study of urban problems in relation to Christianity.

Larry L. Martin, a graduate student in history from Aberdeen, and Valerie G. Spaulding, a freshman from Greensboro, have been assigned to a 28-member project in Ohio. Martin will participate in city work and serve in day camps and vacation church schools, while Miss Spaulding will assume responsibilities in a resident camp for children.

### OKAYS YOUTH CORPS PLAN

The City Council's finance committee today approved a plan to employ an additional 100 youths for work on city beautification, parks, as receptionists and on a city hospitality corps.

Cost to the city will be some \$7,000 to match the \$48,000 grant to be made by the federal government through Operation Breakthrough.

### MANUM, JONES, HERNDON VOLUNTEER FOR TUTORIAL PROGRAM

Rhoda Mangum, Retella Jones, and Carriella Herndon recently volunteered for the summer tutorial program on reading skills for approximately 100 Negro and white school children from low-income families. All three girls are students at Hillside High School.

The tutorial program began in three centers in Durham under the sponsorship of Operation Breakthrough. The centers are located at St. Joseph's AME Church, the John Avery Boys Club and the Edgemont Community Center. They will operate until August 13 and will provide free tutoring in reading for the selected school children Monday through Thursday each week and special field trips each Friday.

According to Mrs. Bessie McLaurin, Operation Breakthrough's coordinator of tutorial centers, the tutors consist of 16 high school graduates and students and three women—all volunteers. They will work under the supervision of eight college students who are employed under the "Work Study" program at Duke University and North Carolina College.

The three women volunteers are Mrs. Margaret Springfield, Mrs. Michael Small and Mrs.

Eugene Day. Mrs. McLaurin also noted that parent volunteers are needed to chaperone the Friday field trips at each of the three centers. She requested that interested parents contact her at St. Joseph's AME Church.

During the past school year the tutorial program gave help with school homework to nearly 500 youngsters from disadvantaged homes who were facing dropping out of school without such help.

Prior to beginning instruction, the volunteer tutors spent a week undergoing special training on how to best teach and deal with young charges from impoverished areas of the city.

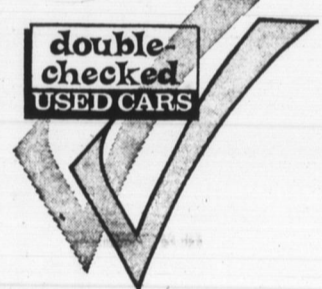
