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

The tutorial program began in three centers in Durham under the sponsorship of Operation Breakthrough. The centers are located at St. Joseph's AME Church, the John Avery Boys Club and the Edgemount Community Center. They will operate until August 13 and will provide free tutoring in reading for the selected school children Monday through Thurs day each week and special field trips each Friday.

According to Mrs. Bessie Mcaurin, Operation Breakbrough's coordinator of tutorial centers, the tutors consist if 16 high school graduates and students and three womenall volunteers. They will work inder the supervision of eight college students who are employed under the "Work Study" program at Duke University and North Carolina College.
