

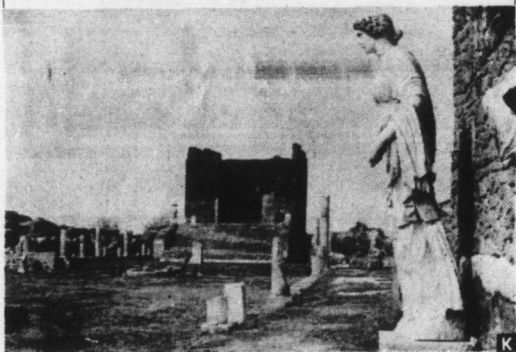

**ITALY** Yesterday, Today and...



Not far from Anzio of "beachhead" fame, which basks in the sun of Italy's east coast, lie the ruins of Ostia, ranking with Pompeii as a tourist "must." The imposing structure pictured here is the "Capitolium," as seen from the Forum. Ostia was the bustling seaport of Rome in the time of the caesars.

The Ostia excavations are particularly impressive because of the many-storied apartment dwellings, broad streets, and magnificent forum, theater, and public buildings. Here (right) is the main street, the Decumanus Maximus, more than 10 yards wide and a mile long. In the center is the public well.

Ostia once bordered on the seacoast, but the sea is now two miles away.

Its former prosperity can be measured by this splendid ancient theater (left), now restored for open-air dramatic and musical performances. The seacoast near Ostia has numerous resorts, among them Fregene, frequented by American and Italian movie stars. Along with Ostia and Anzio, it merits a stopover at one of the famous hotels in the area.

lated to raise funds for the school. Among the prominent persons attending the meeting were: Dr. B. F. Foust, newly elect president of the college; Dr. P. R. Cousin, former president of Kittrell; Mrs. Vorheese D. B. Jamison, president of the Alumni Association; Joseph C. McKinney, President of the Laymen's Organization; Watts Hill, prominent business man of Durham and many others, both members and non-members of the A. M. E. Church.

A subsequent meeting will be held on October 13, the official opening day of the college. At that time officials of the Foundation and Alumni Association will present plans for the raising of a half-million dollars to be used in improving the plant and faculty of the school. The plan is expected to call for an immediate contribution of a minimum of \$10,000 from each of the more than 40,000 members of the AME Church in the Second Episcopal District.

I. O. Funderburg, Cashier of the Mechanics and Farmers Bank of Durham, was named treasurer of the Foundation and will have custody of all funds raised for Kittrell College through its efforts. In addition to the services of Funderburg, H. M. Michaux, Sr., prominent businessman of Durham and president of the Union Insurance and Realty Company will furnish office space and assistance in getting the half-million dollar campaign off the ground. Michaux is a former student of Kittrell and has expressed special interest in the campaign.
