dent's proposals.

"Shoring up the system of jury selections against racial discrimination is a crying need. The snail's pace of school desegregation and the damage that inadequate schooling is doing to Negro and white children each school term makes mandatory the broadening of the Attorney General's authority.

"The President's proposal to ban racial discrimination in all housing is bold and challenging. It poses a real test to those persons who ardently support anti-discrimination in distant places, 'but not next door.' Yet housing is the core of segregation in schools, recreation and health services, and is responsible for the attitude on public accommodations. We regret the omission of any proposal to provide indemnity to the victims of racial violence or to their survivors, and we will seek to have such a provision added to the bill."
